

## MIRIAM AND Moses

One of the first stories that impressed me at Sunday School was




about Moses as a baby placed in a basket into the river Nile and rescued by Pharaoh's daughter. Moses grew up to become a great leader of God's people in the Exodus. But there was one person whose courage and ingenuity was vital in his survival as a baby - his sister, Miriam. She is there with her mother in this tender scene painted by Simeon Solomon, the Pre-Raphaelite artist, in 1860. Jochabed cradles her son, and Miriam looks on with care and concern as she holds the basket that will keep her brother safe. Birds on the window ledge, a potted plant and a lyre provide a gentle background to the drama that will soon unfold.

Like Noah, whom we looked at last month, the story of Miriam is linked to water: helping to save Moses from the waters of the Nile; with the people as the Red Sea parted; and the spring that came up from the earth to give abundant water after her death. All that is still to come when we look at this painting. Here Miriam is about to take her brother and the basket to the Nile to begin the journey that will eventually take God's people from slavery and oppression to new life in the promised land.

The Exodus is an inspiring pilgrimage of faith and trust, and Miriam played her part in it as a courageous leader of the women. To celebrate, she sang a hymn. 'Then the prophet Miriam took a tambourine in her hand; and all the women went out after her with tambourines and with dancing. And Miriam sang to them, 'Sing to the Lord, for he has triumphed gloriously; horse and rider he has thrown into the sea." (Exodus 15). It is a story that can inspire us to sing and even dance when we recall this victory at each Easter.

> set a budget which allows us to N fulfil all our obligations from our annual income, rather than relying on our reserves. It has become clear that it may be necessary for Parish and Town Councils to undertake some of the responsibilities of the County and District Authorities.

For example, Essex County Council's footpath budget has been cut, which means that the Parish Council is funding some of the footpath maintenance in our village for the benefit of residents and visitors. We have also decided to keep the income received from parking fees in the village's car parks in a 'ring-fenced'

reserve to allow us to investigate two specific areas of concern for residents. These are car parking and street lighting. The Parish Council is very aware of the sensitivity of both of these matters and is committed to a comprehensive consultation with all interested parties.

The net result of these budget deciin order to maintain the high standards sions is that the Parish element of your Council Tax will go up this year to £43.51 per household (Band D). This remains lower than most of our neighbouring parishes

# CONSTABLE MEDICAL PRACTICE UPDATE

Demand on the NHS as a whole is at its highest during the winter months. This puts pressure on all our staff and

so it is even more important at this time of the year that we deal with patient problems as efficiently as possible. Please help us by following the guidelines below:

- Tell the receptionist the nature of your problem. They can ensure you see the right clinician (GP, Nurse Practitioner, Practice Nurse) and you may not need to come into the practice if it can be dealt with over the telephone.
- If you need a home visit, please let us know as soon as possible. The doctor will phone you before leaving the practice to ensure they need to see you and they can help with the problem.
- Order repeat medication well in advance and nominate a pharmacy. Many prescriptions can be sent electronically to a pharmacy of your choice. However, it can take up to 3 days for the practice to process you prescription as the doctor will need check that it is safe to issue it.

The clinicians at the practice are not equipped to deal with every problem. If you have a serious acute problem you should attend A&E or dial 999 for emergency assistance. Serious problems include broken bones, severe allergic reactions, breathing difficulties, severe chest pain, severe burns, seizures, very ill children, severe bleeding, poisoning, foreign body in your eye/ear. Staff training dates include: 9th February (Thurs), 8th March (Wed), 19th April (Wed). The practice will close from 1 pm.
