Hymns Old & New No. 292 John Henry Newman (1801-90)

This was said to be Queen Victoria's favourite hymn. It remains a profound statement of Christian experience, an expression of faith and trust in the midst of the darkness of doubt. It speaks of a past regretted and of a future which seems uncertain and perplexing. It is the prayer of someone who trusts, but who is unsure of the way forward. As the last line of the first verse has it: "I do not ask to see the distant scene; one step enough for me."


Some Christians are full of confidence: God is in charge; all will be well. Others less so: life is full of puzzles and problems; the best one can hope for is that one knows what to do next. Others are sometimes one, sometimes the other. Even strong Christians know what it is to be unsure, whether about what faith demands, or about how to keep it faithfully when there is so much in life which places it in question. The Light of Christ which leads them can often seem faint. In those circumstances we need to learn from great souls who have gone before - and who have also had their doubts. They had doubts and uncertainties; often wondering where, or even whether, they were being led. But they trusted Christ, the one true Light, and at last He brought them safely through, or as Newman puts in the last line of this hymn: "the night is gone; and with the morn those angel faces smile, which I have loved long since and lost awhile."





FOOTPATH MAINTENANCE

The footpath between Anchor Lane and East Lane, no. 36, has recently undergone repairs by contractors for Essex County Council. This work was undertaken after full consultation with Dedham Parish Council and local landowners. The path, which forms part of the Essex Way, offers some impressive views across the valley, but was prone to becoming very muddy indeed, making it difficult to negotiate during the winter, even for those wearing Wellington boots. As with all work of this type, the path currently looks rather "stark" but we are assured that it will not be long before vegetation takes hold on the new surfacing and the path assumes a more rural appearance.

Ten Years Ago February 2002

- ♦ GOLDEN JUBILEE Plans were being made for the village celebration of HM The Queen's Golden Jubilee. David Druitt, and Tony Mitchell (Chairman of the Parish Council), took the lead in co-ordinating the many suggestions and ideas for events during the weekend.
- ♦ WOMEN'S INSTITUTE The closure of the Dedham branch was noted in the magazine with sadness.
- ♦ CHURCH PRIORITIES For the year ahead included; re-establishing a creche for pre-school children during Sunday morning service, pay the Parish Share in full (it had not been in 2001), establishing a 'Friends of Dedham Church' all three of which was done!

Fifty Years Ago February 1962

- NEW BISHOPS Our new Bishop, the very Reverend John Tiarks, who is at present the Provost of Bradford, will be consecrated bishop in Westminster Abbey on St. Matthias' Day...'
- ♦ WOMEN'S INSTITUTE 'Mrs Rose showed a film of bird life "North of the Border"... A competition for six mince pies was won by Mrs Jennings...

A Century Ago February 1912

- ♦ OUTBREAK OF MEASLES 'The Sunday School Entertainment had to be postponed on account of the outbreak of measles... the treat has now been [re-] arranged... when those entitled by their attendance and good marks will assemble for tea in the Memorial Hall... entertainment will follow the distribution of prizes.
- ♦ ANNUAL RAINFALL A table of the monthly and annual rainfall in Dedham for the previous decade was published. Here is a summary:

Year : Total Annual Fall (inches) 1901 : 17.23 / 1902 : 18.72 / 1903 : 31.2 1904 : 18.02 / 1905 : 17.14 / 1906 : 22.73 / 1907 : 21.72 / 1908 : 18.71 /

1909 : 28.45 / 1910 : 25.85 / 1911 : 19.89.

Notice that some of those years were almost twice as damp as others!
