GOD IN THE ARTS

'He gave us eyes to see them' PIETER SAENREDAM'S CHURCH OF ST ODULPHUS IN ASSENDELFT

Light features prominently in the life and worship of the Christian Church as it does in many religions. This month of February opens with the feast of Candlemas when we recall that tender moment as the aged Simeon held Jesus in his arms and proclaimed this new-born child as the light for all nations. Standing in the temple, which would have been ablaze with candles, Simeon saw in Jesus a light that would illuminate not buildings, but the hearts and lives of people everywhere.



Saenredam's Church of St Odulphus in Assendelft

Light radiates from another building in this month's painting that hangs in the Rijksmuseum in Amsterdam. It is Pieter Saenredam's portrayal of the Interior of the Church of St Odulphus in Assendelft. Saenredam, born in 1597, was the only son of a talented engraver. He studied in Haarlem and became a gifted artist in what is known as the Dutch Golden Age. The Calvinism of that time would have frowned upon explicitly religious paintings, and so Pieter Saenredam with many Dutch artists imbued their canvasses of churches, countryside and portraits with a religious intensity and grace. We sense that in this painting for the church of St Odulphus is all light. It seems to radiate from the walls just as it pours through the windows. So there are no shadows here, no dark recesses in which to hide.

It is a church Pieter Saenredam knew intimately for he worshipped here as a child. His father was buried there, and we see his grave at the front of the canvas on our right. On one of the pews the artist has put the date of the painting: 2 October 1649. Saenredam, as he depicts the calmness of light and the depth of space, invites us into this church to join those in worship and to rejoice in that gift of light. It is the same feeling we have when we enter a Gothic church in this land. In Norman churches the windows are small and the pillars large, conveying a mood of darkness and awe. In Gothic churches the architecture soars up to the heavens and the buildings are suffused with light pouring in from the large windows that open up the walls.

Pieter Saenredam is proclaiming that gift of light in this painting: the light of creation that shines through the windows, and the light of salvation that is the word made flesh, Jesus. That light is the inspiration for the preacher delivering his sermon here. He may be exhorting the people below to become dwelling places of light, and we might pause to think how that is possible for us.

For 2014, the Rev Michael Burgess is surveying works of sacred art that can be found in the Rijksmuseum in Amsterdam...you can see the image by googling the title of the painting and the artist. This series began in January and will run until December.

TIME TO STARE

The poet William H. Davies, writing in that soon-to-be-lost world just before the beginning of World War I, enquired:

What is life, if, full of care, We have no time to stand and stare?

Writing in The Sunday Times a decade ago, A.N. Wilson observed, "These days children are not allowed to be bored. The hours and hours, followed by further hours, which older people spent in their infancy bouncing a ball, or watching the ascent or descent of a yo-yo, or even, when desperation seized them, reading a book, are probably unknown to the under-14s of today."

Commenting on Wilson's words, Jolyon Connell wrote, "Modern parents, by contrast, spend their time endlessly stimulating children, filling every hour of regret that there seems to be "no time their days and getting them into the state an old-fashioned nanny would call 'over-excited'... and yet learning to cope with boredom is a vital part of preparing for adult life."

You may think that a vicar writing in praise of boredom is rather like politician praising taxes - that there is just the tiniest bit of self-interest in doing it! After all, isn't the Church rather expert in providing boredom? Yet spiritual life (always of interest to a vicar) is often better served by stillness



rather than busyness, by quietness rather than a activity, by focus rather than distraction.

Wilson made a similar point; that it is through boredom, rather than through constant activity, that we develop our inner lives. "Stories, poetry, prayer and mathematics, all activities which have stretched the human race... evolved out of our capacity to live with boredom."

Ash Wednesday, in early March, is a day which marks the start of the Christian season of Lent. Apart from light-hearted references to giving-up something (chocolate, smoking, alcohol are commonly mentioned) Lent is actually intended as a season of spiritual renewal.

If you have had cause in recently to to stand and stare" then consider using Lent to put back some "blue skies" into your diary.

The Parish Church will offer fresh opportunities for quiet fellowship and spiritual renewal during this time. If you are normally busy most of the time, then I would suggest that you're too busy not to pray.

YOU DIRTY RAT!

Rodents can be a particular problem in the winter, with some estimates suggesting the number of rats in the UK at 80 million, as well as millions of mice. Although these rodents are with us all year round, they often move into buildings when the weather gets colder and so can cause more of a health hazard then.

Rats carry a host of diseases, as well as parasites and viruses, while mice also pose health hazards, carrying infection and contaminating foodstuffs.

There are a number of steps that can be taken to prevent rodent problems arising, such as making sure that bird food is placed on a table and not just on the ground and that any leftovers are cleared up. Food rubbish should also not be left outside in bags, where it can be an attraction for rats.

If you do notice tell-tale signs of mice, such as droppings being left or electrical wires being chewed, or you suspect that there are rats in your outbuildings, then you need expert help. The practice is now extending its on-line access to allow patients to book and cancel appointments with GPs via the same secure website. We are aware that not all of our patients have access to the internet and, therefore, a limited number of appointments will be made available for on-line booking. This is a service aimed mainly at working people who find it difficult to access the surgery by telephone during our opening hours. The facility to book appointments with nurses and other members of the clinical team is not being offered as many of their appointments are longer than the standard ten minutes owing the more complex reasons for the appointment. PARISH COUNCIL

Cllr. Jane Hughes writes BUDGET

The budget for next year was agreed at the January meeting. Against a background of reduced services for Essex County Council and Colchester Borough Council (CBC), the objectives were to strengthen resources dedicated to improving and maintaining to £33,728 a year. This sum is greater the condition of the village and to increase our reserves, which are significantly below levels recommended for prudent management. Both objectives have been achieved. The Dedham precept for band D properties contract terms for the PCSO were will be reduced by £3.75 to £27.02, which includes the final payment of £4.82 for the PCSO contract.

COUNCILLORS

A decision was taken to co-opt Mrs Ann Follows as the ninth member of the Council.

CAR-PARKING IN DEDHAM

Progress is being made on reviewing aspects of this strategy, including surveys of usage in the Mill Lane carpark and numbers of employees of Dedham businesses. These are being used to contribute to a final report to be considered by the Council at its meeting on 10 February.

Recommendations from this report will form the basis of final negotiations with CBC on the arrangements to be implemented on I April. Details of various exchanges with CBC can be found on the Parish Council website.

SECURITY MATTERS

At the Council meeting in December we were informed by Sgt. Middleton that from I April, Essex Police Authority will require all part-funded PCSOs to be fully funded by their respective Parish Councils. For Dedham this means the cost of the PCSO will rise from £16,864 than the total amount of village precept.

In addition, the report, presented by Cllr. Sue Vinter, demonstrated that as well as having limited powers, the inflexible - the appointment, allocation of duties and shift patterns were exclusively determined by Essex Police Authority. In essence, the PCSO provided poor value for money.

Regrettably, like several other local villages, we have decided not to renew PCSO contract with Essex Police when it ends in April. The Parish Council appreciates residents will have ongoing concerns about village security and will explore alternative means to tackle future problems. Sgt. Middleton advises residents to ring 101 to seek immediate police contact and also to consider using 'special constables' when appropriate.



Ten Years Ago February 2004

Fifty Years Ago February 1964

♦ DIOCESE JUBILEE The Diocese of Chelmsford was fifty years old. As part of a programme to mark the occasion the Bishop invited parishes to complete an appraisal - concerning the view of the Church by those who did not consider themselves to be part of it.

♦ PAUL REPORT Considered by the Bishop tof Chelmsford to be 'the most important document before the Church for generations', the report by Leslie Paul concerning the deployment and payment of the clergy was 'packed with dynamite'. Among Paul's recommendations was the abolition of the "parson's freehold", i.e. being given a job for life, with a mandatory retirement age of 70 for all clergy.

A Century Ago February 1914
