SONGS OF PRAISE

My song is love unknown, my Saviour's love to me. love to the loveless shown, that they might lovely be. O who am I, that for my sake, my Lord should take frail flesh and die?

Hymns Old & New No. 346

Samuel Crossman (1624-1683) is one of only a few 17th-century English hymn-writers whose work is still to be found in modern hymn books. He was born in 'Bradfield Monachorum', near Bury St Edmunds, which today is called Bradfield St. George. Crossman earned his degree at Pembroke College, Cambridge, becoming minister of All Saints, Sudbury (for more than a century the family home and burial place of most of the Burkitt family). He was expelled after the 1662 Act of Uniformity became law (as was Matthew Newcomen of Dedham) but, unlike most of the other 2,000 or so ministers, he was later ordained into the newly-established Church of England.

It was during his time of 'exile' that he published a short book of nine poems, The Young Man's Meditation, of which this hymn was one. It was then rather lost from view, being included in no hymn-books for almost two hundred years. In 1667 Crossman became a Prebendary (like a 'Canon') of Bristol Cathedral and then, just a few weeks before he died, the Dean. He is buried in the south aisle of the cathedral.

In 1868 the hymn was re-published in the Anglican Hymn Book. John Ireland (1879-1962) was later asked to write a new tune for this hymn, to be included in the Public School Hymn Book of 1919. According to a letter in the Daily Telegraph in 1950, Ireland was supposed to have written the tune, Love Unknown, in just a few minutes. Others say that he wrote it on the back of a menu, after being taken out to lunch by the music editor, Geoffrey Shaw. Our hymn book omits Crossman's penultimate verse:



MAJOR IMPROVEMENTS PLANNED

Thanks to a legacy, and the support of the *Friends of Dedham Church*, the PCC has been able to agree a major series of projects to maintain and improve the Parish Church. During 2009, subject to necessary approval, we plan to:

- repair the external render of the church which, having failed in several places, is letting the building become damp
- repair the South aisle roof and other places where water is getting in
- replace all the fan-convector heaters
- replace the chancel lighting and make it accessible for maintenance
- restore the choir pews; they were installed a century ago and are being attacked by a wood-boring beetle. They will be removed, repaired and restored, but with additional heating and lighting.
- clean the chancel monuments, windows and floor, and re-paint the walls

In 2010, if the congregation and community support the work, we hope to:

- repair the clerestory (high level) windows in the nave which allow water in (these have been scheduled for repair for more than twenty years)
- re-decorate the nave walls (there is a major task of removing some 40
 year-old emulsion from the walls, which should never have been applied,
 before giving the walls several coats of limewash
- remove and restore the pews, having repaired and re-polished the floor

Details of some of the pastoral, mission and social work being supported from the legacy will be given next month.

CHURCH GATE HOUSE 1908

Ten Years Ago April 1999

ASSEMBLY ROOMS The extensive refurbishment was well under way; a brief history was noted: "The main hall was probably built in the autumn of 1744 - some primary timber from the building has been tree-ring dated...to that year. This makes it the third or fourth oldest Assembly Rooms in the country, and the earliest to have been built on a "green-field" site. The other old ones had to be fitted into a town site of awkward size and shape, so ours is...the oldest known Assembly Rooms to have been built to the full design."

Fifty Years Ago April 1959

- ♦ DEDHAM'S 'PASSION PLAY' received a mention in the Radio Times.
- ♦ SOUTH CHAPEL "is now almost completed...it will be appreciated by all those who use the church for midweek services." ♦ JAMES MUIRHEAD Organist and Churchwarden, was obliged through illness to miss playing the organ on Easter Day, the first time in 14 years. ♦ JOHN FULCHER His death, aged 90, was reported. His mother had brewed ginger beer for the boys of Dedham Grammar School. As a child he had cleaned the boots and shoes at Sherman's Hall, then a young ladies' school. He had served in the Royal Navy on HMS Royalist and had enjoyed a long career at Kew Gardens.

A Century Ago April 1909

- ♦ MAJOR-GENERAL SIR MATTHEW GOSSETT His death was reported thus: "To few men are given such gifts of friendship, and the power to inspire affection such as he had." Born in 1839, he belonged to an old Huguenot family [which had moved to Dedham during William Burkitt's time] and had commanded 1st Dorset Regiment, serving in South Africa, Burma, Dublin, and was a veteran of the Indian Mutiny, 1857. His library "was probably the best equipped in Dedham."
- ♦ EBENEZER CLOVER His death was reported thus: "He came to live in Dedham in 1881, when he bought the mill and adjoining property. A shrewd man of business he at once had the mill fitted up with the latest machinery...Just nine months ago the mill was destroyed by fire. Since then it has been rebuilt and only a few days ago was in full working order...He was a leading supporter of the Congregational Chapel." He was 74 years old.
