Hymns Old & New No. 503


The hymn is generally attributed to Edmond Louis Budry (1854-1932) who wrote A Toi la Gloire, 'Thine Be the Glory', in 1884, after the death of his first wife, Marie de Hayenborg. He was a minister of an Evangelical church in Vevey, Switzerland. It was first published in *Chants Evangeliques* in Lausanne, in 1885, and then again in the YMCA Hymn Book, 1904.

A Toi la gloire, O Ressuscite A Toi la victoire Pour l'eternite! Brillant de lumiere, L'ange est descendu, Il roule la pierre Du tombeau vaincu.

It may be that an Advent hymn by Friedrich-Heinrich Ranke (1798-1876), using the same tune by George Handel (1685-1759) could have been the basis for this hymn. The tune for the chorus See the Conquering Hero Comes was first used by Handel in his oratorio Joshua, and later incorporated by him into the work Judas Maccabaeus.

In 1925 Richard Birch Hoyle, a Baptist minister, translated Budry's hymn into English and published it in *Cantate Domino Hymnal*, for the use of the World Student Christian Federation. Hoyle was a man of considerable scholarship, being conversant in twelve languages. The English version was used on Sunday, 22 August, 1948, at the opening service of the World Council of Churches, in Amsterdam.

This hymn is often used in the later weeks of Easter and the beginning of Ascensiontide (i.e. in May), linking as it does the Resurrection narratives in the Gospels with the dispelling of Thomas's doubts, prior to the Ascension of Christ. The hymn is one of the few that is regularly sung at both weddings and funerals; this is for example customary in the Dutch royal family.





VIEW FROM THE VICARAGE

THE RUMOUR OF HOPE

It was Carl Henry who wrote that "lesus Christ blanted the only durable rumour of hope amid the widespread despair of a hopeless world."

For Christians Easter Eve marks the darkest day in human history; when Jesus lay in the grave. The following morning the women who came to the tomb were so changed by what they saw and heard that they found hope in the midst of despair. The 'recession of their hope' had never been greater, vet it was they who began the great 'rumour of hope'. The Church was not founded on the basis of cleverly devised myths. For us, who cannot go to the empty tomb, the words spoken to the women contain all the answers that are needed. The messenger said:

(1) "This lesus of Nazareth, this One who was crucified, this same one whom you seek, has indeed risen from the dead." We need be in no doubt about witnesses of the Cross in despair, the identity of the person.


(2) Then, "He is not here." There are people who argue that, in some sense, it was the spirit of lesus which rose, and that this encouraged his disciples. Yet the resurrection was not merely a happy 'revival of his memory'. It was the body of Christ that was put into the grave, dead, which also rose from the dead.



(3) Only St. Mark records one aspect of the message: "But go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going before you to Galilee." He underscores the fact that lesus is alive, that He rose bodily, and that He was to be found in a particular place and that He wanted a particular person to know about it. The last time we saw Peter he was weeping bitterly. Now, through the power of the resurrection, he was restored.

(4) The last thing the women were told was, "He is going before you to Galilee; there you will see him, as he told you." That is, these are faithful words. The Gospel here underscores the reliability of the words of Jesus, that His promises can be believed. Whatever He said. He also fulfilled. and you can rely upon Him to do it.

It was the resurrection of Christ that changed those women. This is what brought them from being through their recession of hope, to

CHURCH: MORE THAN STONE

In the Will of the late Evelyn Kate Angell, after many substantial gifts to family and friends, she divided her churches, being those of Walton, Frinton and Dedham. The amount received by us in Dedham was a little over £140.000.

It took the PCC a while to agree the priorities for such a generous legacy. At the PCC Awayday in January it was finally agreed that a number of church building projects, several of which have been pending for many years, should be tackled this year. The list of these was given in the magazine last month.

A number of the building projects to heating and lighting, for example, will make a considerable difference to anyone who worships in the church. Yet it was also the concern of the PCC that a proportion of the legacy should also be used for evangelism and mission, for charitable works and for community projects. A proportion of the legacy, up to 30% of the whole, has been ear-marked for this kind of work.

Already a small grant has been made to the Ladies' Fellowship; church youth course. A Growing Leaders course is scheduled for later this year. Other work made possible by Mrs. Angell's legacy will be reported in due course.

DEDHAM CHURCH WEDDINGS

We get as many as fifty enquiries a year to our Parish Office, about the possibility of getting married in Dedham Parish Church. It is always worth having a word with the Vicar about your wedding plans, because he is pleased to be able to discuss them with you.

The following points may be of some use to those who are thinking about marriage. Recent changes to Church of England Marriage law, which completed its parliamentary process last October, means that it is possible for a man and woman to get married in Dedham Parish Church if one of these conditions applies:

- one of them was baptised or prepared for confirmation in the parish;
- one of them has ever lived in the parish for six months or more;
- one of them has at any time regularly attended public worship in the parish for six months or more;
- one of their parents has lived in the parish for six months or more in their child's lifetime;
- one of their parents has regularly attended public worship there for six months or more in their child's lifetime;
- their parents or grandparents were married in the parish.

In cases where either or both of the couple have been married before, it may be possible to arrange a Service of Dedication following a Civil Marriage (often



called 'A Blessing'). This has proved to be a well-regarded service and every year we have one or two services which use this form to make their wedding special. If you want to discuss getting married in this Church, please telephone the Parish Office for an appointment with the Vicar, who'll do his best to help.

HELP FOR CHURCHES

After a year of declining asset values, the Church Commissioners have reassured dioceses that they still intend to continue their present level of support at planned levels through to the end of next year. The Church Commissioners contribute around 15p in the \pounds to the cost of the Church of England's mission. Most of the balance comes from giving by parishioners (and in our case, also friends and visitors).

The Church Commissioners manage investments derived from the Church's historic resources that includes stock market investments, commercial, residential and rural property investments. They look after this as a long-term resource for both current and future generations.



Ten Years Ago May 1999

♦ LIGHTING IN DEDHAM Jim Eley, wrote 'in the Parish Magazine of October 1997... the question was asked [about the lighting in Church - see also next page] "was this electric lighting?" I wanted to reply...but was unable to find a photo that my father took on the first Sunday that the new electric lights were used. It was Palm Sunday, 1934. Before that time I think the church was lit by paraffin lamps...I don't know when electricity first became available in Dedham, but can just remember being wired at the Vale Bakery... in the early 1930's...Early in the century two or three companies in turn, before each became bankrupt, supplied gas to the village, street lights too. The works were at the premises known until recently as 'The Mallard' - now 'The Millstream'.

Fifty Years Ago May 1959

RETIREMENTS Mr. Percy Hunnaball has decided to retire after 30 years or so as caretaker [of Dedham C. of. E. School]...it was decided to appoint Mr. Claude Payne as successor... P.C. Wiggins has just retired ... and Dedham Parish Council paid a tribute to him for many years service in the village.

APPOINTMENTS The Committee responsible for preparing plans for the new church lighting will shortly present their proposals to the PCC... Few changes took place at the elections and at the PCC which followed after, a warm welcome was given to Brigadier Collingwood. The Sidesmen are to be joined by two new members, Mr. Anthony Clover and Mr. William Thorn.


A Century Ago May 1909

CHANCEL RESTORATION "... arrangements had been made for the re-opening of the Chancel. The contracts, both for the restoration work and the stained glass... should be completed by September...the festival of St Michael and all Angels...[has been] provisionally booked for the re-opening ceremony...

DEDHAM'S ARCHBISHOP Knowing his early associations with Dedham, the Vicar had written ... to the Archbishop of Canterbury [Randall Davidson, who had spent part of his early years at the Vicarage in Dedham when his uncle, the Rev'd George Murray had been incumbent.] "He received a very kind letter in reply, 'I am delighted to hear of the good work which you have in hand upon the old Church at Dedham, which I remember so well. My recollections go back to very early days when we used to perform adventurous feats in getting jackdaw's eggs from the outlying parts of the tower..."
