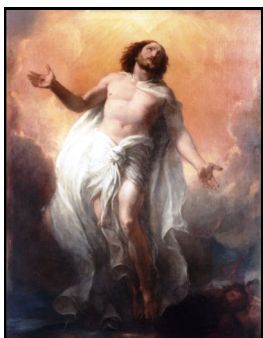

Matthew Bridges

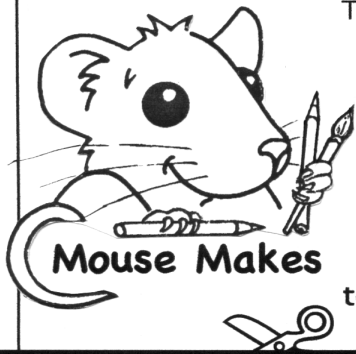
This is a popular hymn that appears in several different versions. Originally written by Matthew Bridges (1800-93), it was altered by Geoffrey Thring (1823-1903) and several hymnals have composite versions using verses by both men. Bridges was born in Maldon, Essex and brought up as an Anglican, though he later became a Roman Catholic and settled for a while in Quebec, Canada, but eventually died and was buried at the Convent of the Assumption, in Sidmouth, Devon.

The first line of this hymn comes from *Revelation* 19: 12. In the second verse, Bridges uses the expression 'mystic Rose', which is a medieval title for the Virgin Mary. The next lines in that verse echo *Isaiah* 11: 1-2, '*And there shall come forth a rod out of the stem of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots: and the spirit of the Lord shall rest upon him*'. The fifth, and last, verse has the only occurrence in a popular hymn (that this Editor can recall) of the words 'Potentate' and 'ineffably!' Notwithstanding his wider use of vocabulary and metaphor, this is the only hymn of the seventeen published by Bridges which has become 'a standard' in most hymnals.

Several tunes are associated with this hymn. The most popular is *DIADEMATA* by Sir George Elvey, who was also the composer of the tune for 'Come, ye thankful people, come'. Elvey's tune for 'Crown him' first appeared in *Hymns Ancient and Modern* in 1868. Another tune especially for this hymn is *CORONA* by C. Hylton Stewart, which he wrote in 1927.

VIEW FROM THE VICARAGE

WELCOME TO TERRY & TONI

Following an imaginative suggestion from Bishop Christopher, the Bishop of Colchester, I am delighted to be able to publish here, what I announced at the Annual Church Meeting last month, that Dedham is to have the ministry of an associate priest for a while, beginning this month.

The Rev'd Terry McFadden has been 'serving his title' (his first curacy) in the parishes which serve Greenstead in Colchester. Terry, and his wife Toni (who grew up in Toxteth, Liverpool), live with their three older children on the edge of that estate, not far from the Bromley Road which, by motorbike, (Terry's preferred mode of transport) is only a few minutes away.



God's call upon Terry's life has been quite remarkable and his testimony to God's faithfulness is most moving. Terry became a Christian eleven years ago, something for which Toni had prayed for many years, through the fellowship and witness of the church in Tolleshunt D'Arcy, in mid-Essex. His vocational journey to the ordained ministry has, as Terry will probably explain, been far from straightforward. It is to the credit of the Church of England that (contrary to common belief) it is able to discern vocation in all sort of people, for there is no certain 'type' that is sought!

Later this year Terry will be seeking an appointment as a vicar somewhere. Terry has a heart for mission and, even before he was ordained, regularly self-financed trips to support Christians in civil war-torn northern Uganda. On the diminished income of a clergyman, he has changed his sights to eastern Europe, particularly Romania, where he actively and personally encourages the growth of the Church.

Meanwhile, without the upheaval of having to move home, and until the autumn, Terry will bring his developing gifts of ministry to us in Dedham.

Until recently, he had never been to this village. The contrast between here and the urban part of borough of Colchester made quite an impact on him. He said that the

journey here seemed more than the few miles of road that he had travelled.

There will be a welcoming service for them Terry and Toni on the morning of **Sunday 22 May**, at what will be our Parish Communion for this month. Please put the date in your diary, so that we may give them a good welcome. Also, please remember to pray for Terry and his family, that they may be blessed and be a blessing during their time with us.

NEWSROUND

Alan Grego writes

EVEREST: A DECADE LATER (I)

Ten years ago this month, Alan Grego published in this Magazine part of the diary of his trek in Nepal. In March this year he went back to Nepal.

John Hill drove Alan Grego and Tony Howard to Heathrow, where they met up with David Howard and Daniel Lambert-Gorwyn for their flight to Kathmandu, via Delhi, on an overnight flight. Arriving in Nepal, they drove through some big crowds celebrating the Hindu festival of *Subaratrai*. Sohan greeted them at the hotel with the customary garlands of flowers and soon afterwards Ram, their guide, arrived.

Next day, Thursday, they all went by rickshaw to Durbar Square (the 'Trafalgar Square' of Kathmandu) and down Freak Street (a hangover from the city's hippy past), then to a rooftop restaurant, with good views over Kathmandu. David bought peacock feathers and a model cockerel. Ram arrived in the evening to sort out the trekking permits (Nepal, like most Asian countries, is very bureaucratic).

On Friday they took a taxi, hoping to get to Bhaktapur, south of the city, but were diverted owing to an accident, so went to Patan (one of three 'royal' towns in the valley, as Windsor is to London). They went to the museum and had a meal in the pleasant open-air restaurant, and walked through the extensive market streets to see all the stalls.

On Saturday, up at 5.30 a.m. for taxis to the domestic airport, and a flight to Lukla (the nearest landing strip to Everest). The landing, after a bumpy flight, was at about 9 a.m. Breakfast in the Himalaya Lodge and then the trek proper began, as they headed for Phakding. Arriving at Beer Garden Lodge, they found good en-suite rooms. They sat outside with Ram and the porters, Gopa and Ratna, and played pontoon, using dried beans as currency.

On Sunday, they set off for the Sagarmartha (Everest) National Park, crossing a 80m-high suspension bridge over the Dudh Kosi river on the way, then began the tiring 600m climb to Namche Bazaar (the lowest part of which is 3,400m, or 11,300 ft. high).

Ten Years Ago **May 2001**

- ◆ **CONSTABLE PAINTING INSTALLED** The painting of *The Ascension*, on loan through the generosity of the Constable Trust, was installed in time for a special service on Ascension Day, 24 May.
- ◆ **FAREWELL TO BISHOP EDWARD** Parishioners were invited to Evensong in Dedham, as a farewell to Bishop Edward Holland, who would soon be retiring as the Bishop of Colchester.

Fifty Years Ago **May 1961**

- ◆ **THE HEATH SCHOOL** had been completely restored.
- ◆ **PARISH CHURCH REFURBISHMENT** *'We are nearing the completion of the work in the Parish Church. We shall all be pleased to see the last of the scaffolding after so long a time. On the whole I believe [wrote the Vicar] most people are pleased with the work...'*
- ◆ **WOMEN'S INSTITUTE** *'there will be a talk on "Hedgerow Basketry" by Mrs. Legg. The competition will be for Six Sausage Rolls.'*
- ◆ **ESSEX ROSE TEAROOM** Miss Loe advertised that the Tearoom was *'Open daily, except Mondays, during the summer months and on Saturday and Sunday afternoons in the winter [and had] charming divan rooms also available with breakfast.'*

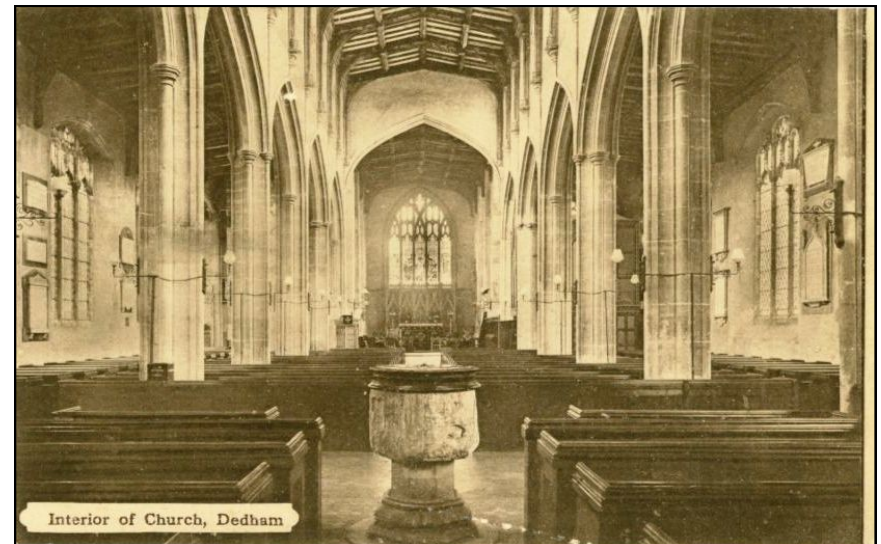
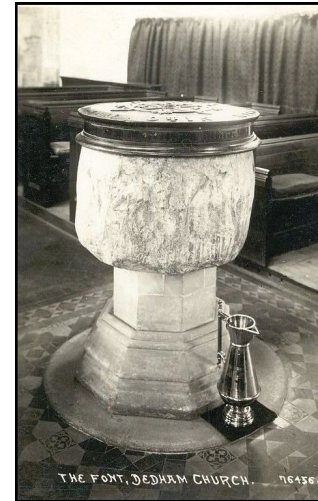
A Century Ago **May 1911**

- ◆ **CONDOLENCES TO MR. HEWITT** The Annual Meeting of the Parish Church had received apologies from Mr. W.W. Hewitt, whose elder brother, the Rev. Thomas Hewitt, sometime Fellow of Emmanuel College, Cambridge, and Rector of Preston, Suffolk, had died. Condolences were formally given. [A brief biography of him is given in this edition of the Magazine]
- ◆ **MISS TINNING OF CASTLE HOUSE** Miss Tinning, formerly of Castle House, had died in April. Her brother, William Tinning, died *'not quite two years ago'*.
- ◆ **DEDHAM TROOP OF BOY SCOUTS** had given their first Display in April.

PAST TIMES

MOVING OF THE FONT

Originally at a crossing between the North and South doors, and the West door, the old font is now in the South-West corner of the church. The great bowl of the font was damaged by 'iconoclasts' (those who opposed the idea of images in churches, during the mid-17th-century) and was later buried in the chancel, before later still being recovered and re-sited by the Victorians. The support is thought to have once been the base of one of the columns in church. The picture below dates from the 1910s (showing gas lanterns on the columns); the one to the left (showing the encaustic floor-tiles and brass ewer) from the 1950s.



SIMILAR PHOTOGRAPHS WANTED FOR THE ARCHIVES
