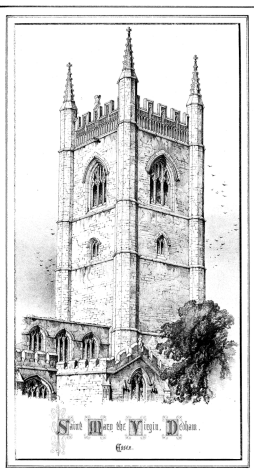

SONGS OF PRAISE

*The day thou gavest, Lord, is ended:
the darkness falls at thy behest;
to thee our morning hymns ascended,
thy praise shall sanctify our rest.*

Hymns Old & New No. 475

Perhaps because of the decline in the number of churches which hold evening services (Dedham being a happy exception), this hymn is no heard less often than at one time. It is the work of John Ellerton (1826-93). Educated in the Isle of Man and at Trinity College, Cambridge, he came under the influence of F.D. Maurice and the Christian socialism movement. He was ordained in 1850. As vicar of Crewe Green in Cheshire he wrote 86 hymns, including another still sung at Evening Payer, *Saviour again to thy dear name we raise*.

The hymn by which he is best known, *The day thou gavest*, was written in 1870. Ellerton got the idea from an anonymous hymn with the identical first line, and he worked with William Walsham How to publish a collection of hymns in 1871, including this one. In 1875 Ellerton had a major hand in the preparation of a revised version of *Hymns Ancient and Modern*, in which no less than 26 of his own hymns appeared. He was also responsible for the publication of hymn books for children, mission, and the temperance movement. After an attack of pleurisy he moved from Barnes in West London to the less demanding parish of White Roding, in Essex. He was a courteous, hard-working and gentle man, who was beloved by all who knew him.

The tune ST CLEMENT was composed for this hymn by Rev'd. Clement Scholefield (1839-1904), onetime chaplain of Eton. Although now universally used for this hymn, and appreciated, it was initially dismissed by many musicians as being a feeble waltz tune. Vaughan Williams consigned it to what he called his 'chamber of horrors' in the *English Hymnal* of 1906. In 1932 the then Archbishop o Canterbury, Cosmo Lang, started a controversy in the correspondence columns of *The Times* by dismissing the hymn in vehement terms.

None of this criticism has diminished the popularity of this hymn for use on solemn occasions. It is, naturally enough, a popular choice at funerals. By her request, it was sung at a service to mark the Diamond Jubilee celebrations of Queen Victoria's reign in 1897. A century later it was sung in Hong Kong at the official ceremony to mark the handing of the Colony back to China, in 1997.

WHERE IT IS DANGEROUS TO BE A CHRISTIAN

For the sixth year running North Korea has again been revealed as the most dangerous country in which to be a Christian. This is the key finding of the 2008 *World Watch List* of the worst 50 nations for persecuting Christians, recently published by *Open Doors*, an international charity serving persecuted Christians worldwide. *Open Doors'* major new report, places Saudi Arabia in second place, followed by another country ruled by *sharia* law: Iran.

Islam is the majority religion in six of the top ten countries: Saudi Arabia, Iran, Maldives, Afghanistan, Yemen and Uzbekistan. Three countries have communist governments: North Korea, Laos and China. Bhutan, which has recently ceased being an absolute monarchy, is the only Buddhist country in the top ten.

Many of the nations which feature on the list are signatories to the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, which should guarantee Christians freedom of conscience and religious expression. In many countries, such as North Korea, Libya, Jordan and Belarus, persecution has grown significantly worse over the past year. In Pakistan, which has a sizeable Christian minority, believers are more closely monitored than before as radical Muslim influence grows.

In the Palestinian Territories, Rami Ayyad, the manager of a *Bible Society* bookshop, was tortured and murdered by extremists in October 2007. In Turkey in April 2008, three Christians, Tilmann Geske, Necati Aydin and Ugur Yuksel were bound, tortured and murdered. Their work in printing and distributing Turkish Bibles is thought to have been the reason.

Other countries where Christians have been killed *because of their faith* in the past year include Afghanistan, Eritrea, Iraq, Azerbaijan, Libya, Burma, Northern Sudan, India, Algeria, Nigeria, Tajikistan, Indonesia and Turkmenistan.



The Bishop of Shrewsbury, Rt. Rev'd Alan Smith said, "We need to support our fellow Christians in other countries, many of whom are suffering or whose lives are under threat." Praying for and in other ways supporting persecuted Christians will be the theme of all our services on Sunday 8 June.

NEW PARISH COUNCIL

The first post-election meeting of the Parish Council was held on 14 May.

The composition of the Council has changed significantly, and we have said goodbye to Robert Cort, John Osborn, Lynn West, and most significantly, former chairman Valerie Guglielmi. Val had chaired the Council with a

sympathetic yet firm hand and will be much missed. The new Council extend their best wishes to her and the other outgoing councillors.



We welcome new Councillors, Reg Appleby, Mark Dempsey, Kim Spencer, Barry Stewart and

Brian Hindley (who was co-opted to fill the vacant seat). The new chairman is Peter Moorhouse. Details of all the councillors will feature on the village notice boards and on our website (see below).

PUBLIC TOILETS

The limited toilet facilities in the village have been a problem for some time, and is especially a problem during holiday weekends. Colchester Borough Council has now installed temporary facilities in the car park area. These toilets are "plumbed in" to the main services, thus simplifying maintenance, and they are expected to remain in place until the autumn. Residents may care to inspect them, 'at their own convenience', so to speak.

It remains the Parish Council's long-term aim to provide permanent public toilets in this area and CBC assure us that they are making budgetary provisions for this purpose. It will, of course, be ensured that any new and permanent structure complements its surroundings.

"SECTION 106" FUND

The Parish has now accumulated a "Section 106" fund of over £13,000. This money, which is available for use in village community projects, arises from payments made by developers in respect of successful Planning Applications. Prior to the start of the next Parish Council meeting in June, a representative from CBC will give a presentation explaining how the funds may be accessed and examples of qualifying projects. Please do come along to the Assembly Rooms to learn more about this scheme.

Ten Years Ago **June 1998**

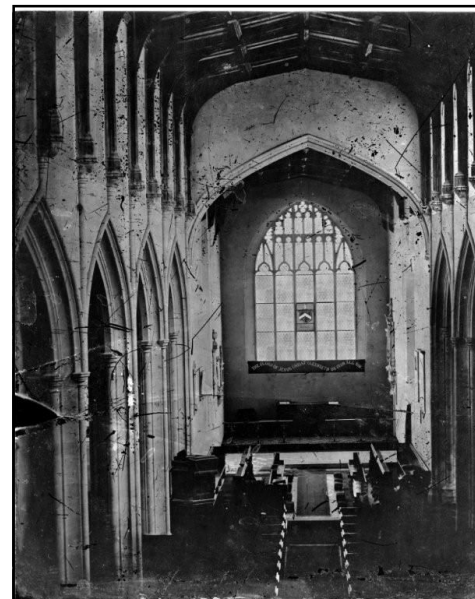
Fifty Years Ago **June 1958**

Swedish operatic soprano *Stella Andrevá* (who recorded with Jussi Björling and Victoria de los Angeles) sang two arias by Handel at Mattins - this was the second time she had visited Dedham; the once-in-a-decade *Lambeth Conference* was taking place (as indeed it is again this Summer); the first meeting of the new *Managers of Dedham C.E. School* took place on Tuesday 20 May, they included the Vicar, Maj.-Gen. F.W. Burch, Rev. W. G. Crane, Col. D. Rowley and Mrs C. Woods; the *Mother's Union outing* was announced as going to Kings Lynn, Sandringham and Hunstanton.

A Century Ago **June 1908**

A Vestry Meeting was held to discuss "the proposed restoration of the Chancel, which has been made possible by the munificence of Mr. W.W. and Miss Hewitt...(1) to re-open and repair four windows of the Chancel which are at present closed...restoring the tracery and mullions according to the design of the two existing windows...(2) to take down on the south side of the Chancel the outer face of the top of the wall, and to rebuild...the missing parapet and the string course...(3) to bring forward the two steps...so that the Celebrant and the Communicants may be on the same level...and to renew the existing Altar rails (4) to relay the lead of the Chancel roof...(and) strengthen the Chancel roof with two main trusses...(and that) the floor of the Chancel be repaved. The whole restoration is to be carried out...under the supervision of Mr. J.G. Jackson, R.A. A Faculty was also sought "for the opening up of the west end of the Nave, by the removal of the Screen and Seats which at present obstruct entrance by the great west door of the Church."

Dedham Parish Church before 1863



This picture, the earliest known of the interior of Dedham Parish Church, is taken from a (broken) glass-plate photograph in the Muniment Room. It has been partially restored by Elm Studios of Ipswich, who are still working on it. It shows the view East inside Dedham Parish Church. According to the Victoria County History of Essex, "The church was restored in 1862-3, to plans by James Mackenzie Roberts, a local architect. (during which) The gallery was removed; the chancel floor was raised, and the Perpendicular-style piscina and sedilia were inserted in its wall."

This photograph was clearly taken from a gallery, and there is no sign of the *sedilia* (ministers' seats, which are usually in alcoves) and which is found now on the right of the Sanctuary. This information dates the photograph to before 1863. It was possibly taken, prior to the changes described being made, as a record of the Chancel and Sanctuary as it was.

The text in the wavy line under the window (which, since 1909, has been hidden by the *reredos*, or screen behind the communion table) reads:

"The blood of Jesus Christ cleanseth us from all sin"

which is taken from I John 1: 7. The coat-of-arms ("Sable, a chevron Argent, between three garbs Or") is that of William Burkitt, who was Vicar & Lecturer here 1692-1703. This suggests that the window was commissioned by his widow Mary (née Cox) at the same time as the memorial which she arranged for him, which can be seen in the photograph to the right of the Sanctuary. This would mean that this clear-glass window and coat-of-arms was in place from c.1704 until c.1862, or for more than 150 years.
