GOD SAVE OUR GRACIOUS QUEEN

For all the criticism that the Church of England receives, it is worth noticing how much the Queen values and appreciates it. She attends services at Windsor and Sandringham not out of obligation or duty but because she wants to do so. I once knew a Royal Chaplain and he shared this with me.

In a speech at Lambeth Palace in February, the month which saw the Queen reach the Diamond Jubilee of her reign, she was reflecting on the role of the Church of England today when she said that the concept of an established Church was 'occasionally misunderstood' and 'commonly underappreciated'. Addressing a reception of at which there were representatives of all the main faiths found in our land. she said that the Church of England had 'gently and assuredly' created an environment for faith communities and people of no faith to live freely, for 'woven into the fabric of this country, the Church has helped to build a better society.'

The Archbishop of Canterbury, Dr. Williams, in his final few months of office, said as he welcomed HM The Queen, 'If we take seriously the way our constitution works, the United Kingdom is a society where we might expect people to grasp the importance of symbols and traditions, not as a sign of mere conservatisim or nostalgia but as a sign of what holds us together.'

His predecessor, William Temple, once observed that the Church exists for the benefit of its non-members, and in Dedham this is clearly true. Less than 200 different people worship in the church on Sundays in the course of a month - but hundreds more walk through its doors, even in the coldest months, to appreciate something of the beauty of holiness, of the Christian faith and sustaining stewardship to which our parish church bears witness.

There are some occasions in the story of our nation which bring us all together, regardless of our many differences. You don't have to be a Christian to come into Church, any more than you have to be a Royalist to appreciate and give thanks for the sixty years of service and example which HM The Queen has given to our nation and to the wider Commonwealth.

Over the Jubilee weekend there will be several opportunities for the people of this village to come together. The programme for Sunday 3 June is to be found elsewhere in this magazine.

I also extend a personal invitation to all who live in Dedham (some 1,850 of you) to the special Civic Celebration service at 10.30 a.m. Do come early, as only the first 450 or so will get a seat!

JUBILEE THAMES FLOTILLA

[Jonathan, who worships in our parish church, will be taking part in this national event. Here he tells us why...] I am the privileged skipper of one of the 'little ships of Dunkirk'. Her name is Ferry Nymph (the original name). She was built in 1938 as a 40' harbour ferry for Poole and, requisitioned by the Admiralty in 1940, she completed two voyages from Dunkirk to Ramsgate. On the first she carried 72 troops and the second 90. Thereafter she was used as a supply boat until Operation Dynamo was concluded. Churchill said it would be a miracle if 50,000 troops were evacuated; in all 340,000 out of 400,000 troops were evacuated from the beaches. Ferry Nymph will be taking

DUCHY BARN SHED RESTORED

The Duchy Barn Shed has in recent years fallen into a state of disrepair and had become uninsurable. The shed is one of the oldest buildings in Dedham and was originally a cart lodge for the nearby farm of a Manor House. The Parish Council, who rent the building from the Vicar and Churchwardens, took on the project to restore the building. The only way to preserve the building was carefully to take it down and re-build it using as much of the original brickwork and tiles which, it is



believed, were made in Dedham. Some of the bricks were etched by schoolchildren when the shed formed part ofthe old Grammar School. A local builder, Peter Gibbins, took on this task. With planning permission the new building has been re-designed internally so that a portion of it can be accessed directly from the Duchy Barn. Dedham Youth Club now store their equipment out of the way of the main area in the Barn, making a bigger area safer and available for community use.

FIRST RESPONDERS

First Responders is a group of volunteers who respond to emergency ambulance service, primarily to give first aid to heart attack victims until an ambulance arrives. In the event of a heart attack the chances of survival are greatly increased if treatment is given within the first eight minutes. Such a team already operates in Stratford St Mary and they also cover call outs to Dedham, but they need more volunteers to provide full-time cover. Volunteers typically provide cover for a few hours each week and call outs for this area are thankfully rare, only one or two a month. To volunteer you need to be physically fit, have a full driving licence and be prepared to undertake training. This is quite straightforward and the equipment is very easy to use. If you are interested please contact Sue Lawrence on 322 066.

GOD BLESS

By the Rev.

THEN Her Majesty our Queen reached her twenty-first birthday she broadcast a memorable message to her country. It was at once a proclamation and a promise

—a proclamation of her faith in Almighty God and a promise of dedicated service throughout her life. There were few people who foresaw at the time that she would be called so soon to implement that promise in the highest of all human offices.

England has been fortunate in her monarchs. For the most part they have proved an inspiration and an example. To this, their long and arduous training, added to their personal qualities, have contributed in no small degree. But we must never overlook the power of the Coronation Service which, as a calling down of God's grace, closely resembles the Ordination Service.

There is also a close parallel between the Coronation Service and a wedding ceremony. What really happens at a wedding is that a man and woman make a solemn contract with each other in the presence, and with the blessing, of Almighty God. The Coronation Service is the time when the Queen and her people make a solemn contract with each other in that same presence and with that same blessing.

In a world where change and decay have become all too closely associated, there is considerable virtue in the mere fact that it is in England where apparently the Christian Coronation Rite had its origin that it has survived the longest. But mere longevity is the least of its virtues. Its meaning is much more important. For it ex-plicitly teaches that a Christian monarch is no irresponsible despot but a leader whose position depends on service and goodwill. This fact emerges at many points in the service.


After the Archbishop of Canterbury

has presented the Queen to her people and they have accepted her by acclamation, there follows a solemn supplication, the Creed and a Sermon.

Those who knew the preaching capacity of seventeenth century divines directed that this was to be "short and suitable to the occasion." It is at this point that the Oueen makes the oath whereby she promises protection and peace to the Church, the repression of all rapacity and iniquity and

the tempering of justice with mercy "in order that to me and you a clement and merciful God may vouchsafe His pardon,"

It is significant that even when the Queen is making her promises there is the reminder that they and their effects cover "me and you." She does so not in any private capacity but as a representative of her people. Simi-larly, when the Archbishop reaches the great Benediction immediately before the Queen is enthroned, while in the first instance it is directed upon the Queen personally, it later widens out to include her reign and finally

the nation at large.

To regard the Coronation service as an occasion when the Queen makes promises exclusive to herself and receives grace exclusive to herself is rather like regarding the marriage ceremony as an occasion when the man is the only active partner. If we give this solemn moment the prayer and attention it deserves, we shall find that when the Queen comes out of Westminster Abbey this month something important will have happened

to us also.

We Christians must see to it that the great fact of our Faith is con-stantly kept in the forefront. During this great period we should be able to dedicate ourselves anew to God's service. But we must not let the dedication end with our worship in Church or in the Christian acts we

perform day by day.

Why should we not see to it that this year marks the time when every facet of our activity is offered anew to God? In our pleasures, as well as in our work, we can and must be practising Christians. There is plenty of room for a more Christian approach to our sport, to our amusements, to our use of leisure, to our work. This is the opportunity to hallow them all. It is a clarion call not only to the clergy and leaders of the nation. It is a call to the film star and the professional footballer, to the rich and the poor. It is a call to YOU.



Coronation Day June 1953

♦ MY DEAR FRIENDS,

The Coronation of our beloved Queen Elizabeth will take place on June 2nd. Only a few out of the many millions can be present in Westminster Abbey for the service but, with the aid of television and wireless broadcasting, the whole world will be able to take part in the Coronation with her. The Coronation of our queen has world-wide interest, but not everyone will appreciate the spiritual significance of the occasion. All truly Christian people will, and articles in newspapers, journals and special broadcast programmes, outlining the main elements of the service, will already have prepared our minds to understand that Her Majesty can only effectively rule over us by the grace and power of the Holy Spirit which will be bestowed upon her at her Coronation.

When the Queen broadcast last Christmas Day, she said something which appealed to the hearts of all her people. You gill remember that she referred to the time of her Coronation and said: "I want to ask you all, whatever your religion may be, to pray for me on that day". Director: Michel Hazanavicius (2011)




The Artist is a French romantic comedy drama in the style of a black-and-white silent film. The film was written and directed by Michel Hazanavicius and stars Jean Dujardin and Bérénice Bejo. The story takes place in Hollywood, between 1927 and 1932, and focuses on the relationship of an older silent film star and a rising young actress, as silent cinema falls out of fashion and is replaced by the "talkies".

Outside a movie premiere, enthusiastic fan Peppy Miller literally bumps into the swashbuckling hero of the silent film, George Valentin. The star reacts graciously and Peppy plants a kiss on his cheek as they are surrounded by photographers. The headlines demand: "Who's That Girl?" and Peppy is inspired to audition for a dancing bit-part at the studio. Hymns Old & New No. 177

Should our National Anthem properly be regarded as a hymn? It is addressed to the Almighty and it appears in almost every major hymn-book, so it certainly is a hymn. As this month sees the international celebration of the Diamond Jubilee of H.M. The Queen, which seems reasons enough to repeat this choice (it was last featured in 2009).

The origins and authorship of this hymn are obscure. It first appeared in the form we now know it (with 'King' and 'him' in the appropriate places) in the *Gentleman's Magazine* in October 1745, where it was described as having been sung in several London playhouses. This was at the time of the Jacobite rising ("Bonnie Prince Charlie") and it seems likely that the song was initially an anthem for Hanoverian loyalists.

The words have been attributed to a Henry Carey (?-1743), the poet who was also said to be responsible for the words and music of the popular song Sally in our Alley (which Gracie Fields sang during the 1940s). Other authorities attribute the tune to Dr John Bull (?-1628), who was organist at Antwerp Cathedral. Indeed, a French song, uncannily similar in language, structure and metre, was sung at the court of Louis XIV in 1686.

A distinctly "xenophobic and bellicose" (i.e. foreigner-hating and war-like) verse is usually omitted. In 1836 William Hickson (1803-70), a London boot manufacturer turned social reformer, re-wrote the verses to better reflect Christian principles. It is from his version that the present third verse is taken:

Not on this land alone —
But be Thy mercies known
From shore to shore.
Lord, make the nations see that all humanity
Should form one family the wide world o'er.
