SONGS OF PRAISE

O Lord, my God, when I, in awesome wonder, Consider all the works Thy hand has made I see the stars, I hear the rolling thunder, Thy pow'r throughout the universe displayed.

Hymns Old & New No. 380

This popular hymn is the result of a treble translation; from Swedish into English by way of German and Russian. Generally known by the words of its chorus as 'How great Thou art', the English version is the work of a British missionary and evangelist, Stuart K. Hine (1899-1989).

The original Swedish poem was written by Carl Boberg (1859-1940), an evangelist, journalist and Member of Parliament. In 1886 a rainbow had formed following an afternoon rainstorm and a church bell was tolling in the distance. Boberg was moved to write a nine-verse poem beginning, 'O store Gud'. A fairly literal translation of the first verse would be:

O Thou great God! When I the world consider Which Thou hast made by Thine almighty Word; And how the web of life Thy wisdom guideth, And all creation feedeth at Thy board:

Boberg's verses were set to a Swedish folk tune in 1891 (which is the tune still used in all versions today) and were included in several Swedish hymnbooks. In the 1920s they were translated into other languages, including German. In 1927 this German version was translated into Russian. It was this hymn that Stuart Hine heard being sung in the western Ukraine, where he had gone as a missionary in 1923. While Hine was in Carpathia, on the Russian-Romanian border, he wrote the first three English verses.

Hine wrote the fourth English verse when he returned to Britain in 1948, a year in which more than 100,000 refuges from Russia and other parts of Eastern Europe came to the United Kingdom. The question in many of their minds was "When are we going home?" Hine later wrote, "What better message for the homeless than that of the One who went to prepare a place for the 'displaced' of God...?"

In 1954 Hine's version came to the Billy Graham Crusade team, who first used it in Toronto in 1955. From then on it became popular wherever the Crusade team went, becoming (according to baritone soloist Cliff Barrows), "a keynote of praise each evening". It is still enjoyed by those who would celebrate both the glory of God in creation and the wonder of His love.



The few people in the stadium rose and applauded him until he crossed the finishing line. As he finally hobbled away, he was asked why he had not

given up, as he had clearly had no chance of winning a medal. His reply was memorable. He said simply: "My country did not send me to Mexico City to start the race, they sent me here to finish it." He had looked beyond the pain of the moment and kept his eye on the purpose for which he was there.


In Mexico, in 1968, some die-hard spectators lingered in the Olympic stadium, watching the late finishers of the Marathon. Over an hour before the race had been won. It was getting cold and dark, when suddenly the small crowd heard the sound of sirens and police whistles coming to the stadium. As they watched, one runner made his way onto the track for the last lap of the 26 mile race. It was John Akhwari of Tanzania. As he ran the final circuit of the track people saw that his leg was So it was that he came to provide me bandaged and bleeding. He had fallen and injured himself earlier in the race, but had refused to let it stop him.


Next month at the Olympics in China there will be many similar athletes, determined to finish their race. As Christians, we are also called to 'finish the race before us' as we fulfil

"It's not a shop, but a Resource Centre". So said a young member of the Church, quite correctly, when she was putting an even younger one straight. The difference? Well, that of purpose and design. The lovely new furniture has been given to the Church in memory of the late Anne Davis, by her husband Peter. The new Resource Centre will be dedicated on Sunday 7 September, during the main morning service.

The quest to restore some form of NHS provision to the village, following the closing of the Parsons Field surgery nearly five years ago, remains an overriding objective. Local people are urged to come along and contribute to the discussion.

DEDHAM VALE BID SUCCESS

Dedham Vale Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty & Stour Valley Project has been awarded a £925,000 grant for their 'Managing a Masterpiece' bid to the Heritage Lottery Fund's (HLF) Landscape Partnership Scheme, and a further £67,000 development funding grant. Fifteen projects of archaeology, biodiversity and conservation of historic features in the Stour Valley are included in the bid, and three new members of staff will be appointed.

"This is the first Landscape Partner-ship award in the East of England, and will be of enormous benefit to those who live and we don't know where they are," says work in the Stour Valley" said Simon Amstutz, Operations Manager for the Project. "We are thrilled that our partners are putting in a further £100,000, which together with in-kind contributions from volunteers, brings funding to £1.1 m."

The Stour Valley has long inspired artists and writers. 'Managing a Masterpiece' consists of three programmes to understand, conserve and celebrate the landscape. These will focus on clusters of heritage

hotspots around Clare, Sudbury, Bures, Stoke by Nayland and Dedham. Projects will include the return of the Constable Country hopper bus which was

so successfully piloted in 2005, restoring views made famous by artists, and using churches as viewpoints and information centres. We will also be publishing guides for walking and cycling, facilitating archaeological excavations, and helping the restoration of the John Constable lighter to the dry dock at Flatford.

Tim Yeo, MP for South Suffolk, took a leaf out of the Project's tree when he launched the Ancient Tree Hunt at the Hadleigh Show. The Project is looking for help in identifying ancient trees in the area. "There are hundreds of ancient trees in the Dedham Vale - but Emma Black, Community Officer for the Project. "They are part of our heritage, and like ancient buildings, need our protection. We want to measure and record them, and we welcome help from the public in locating them."

The Ancient Tree Hunt is a national project led by the Woodland Trust in partnership with the Ancient Tree Forum and the Tree Register of the British Isles. They have already recorded 15,710 trees, of which 1,400

have been verified as

ancient. Ancient trees can live up to 5,000 years, and the UK has more ancient trees than any other country in northern Europe.

PAST TIMES

Ten Years Ago July 1998

The Vicar wrote about his visit to the World Trade Center in New York; the baptism of Anna Grace Buttery, Emily Rose Murray and Jack Ryan Phillips (which had taken place on 3 May) was reported.

Fifty Years Ago July 1958

The Church organ, it was reported, had been moved to its position in the South Aisle, from its earlier position in the West end, in 1887. According to Rev'd Charles Jones, in his *History of Dedham*, Edward Mens was the organist from 1854 to the 1890s, and he said that the congregation used to turn round to the West to face it when singing. Canon Johnston said that it was estimated to cost £7,000 to move the organ back to a gallery in the West end [its present position]. Manningtree School celebrated its 21st Anniversary by holding a thanksgiving service in Dedham Church; Colin Towns died whilst learning to swim at Judas Gap, on the River Stour.

A Century Ago July 1908

"Not for many a long year has so great a calamity visited Dedham as that which took place on Friday night, June 19th, when the Mill in...two or three hours, was completely burnt to the ground...only the stubborn perseverance of many willing workers...saved the cottages opposite. Much anxiety was felt for the Gas Works...twice the thatch of the cottages in Mill Lane caught fire...pieces of flaming timber fell in the Street, and glowing grains of corn were scattered...as far as the Long Road... We understand that as soon as possible the Mill will be rebuilt, and we are glad that this important trade will not be lost to Dedham"

Miss Eyre had left £1,500 in her Will for clothing for the children attending the National School, the Vicar and Churchwardens and the Managers of the School were the trustees.
