
Hymns Old & New 490

Still among the most frequently requested hymns, particularly for weddings and funerals, this metrical version of Psalm 23 was, perhaps surprisingly, the work of a committee. Long appreciated in Scotland, it has only been known and popular in England since it was chosen by the Queen for her wedding in 1947.

This version of the psalm first appeared in Scotland in 1650, in a book drawn up by the Westminster Assembly, which also drew up the Westminster Confession which is the official doctrinal statement of the Church of Scotland. The Assembly put together this version from several different sources; the first line, for example, was written by a Scotsman, Zachary Boyd (1585-1654), the second by a Cornishman, Francis Rous (1579-1658) who was a friend of Oliver Cromwell and who became Provost of Eton, and several other lines were by Sir William Mure of Rowallan (1594-?).

This hymn did not appear in any Anglican hymnbook until 1965, when it was set to the tune CRIMOND, a tune which is usually attributed to Jessie Irvine (1836-87), whose father was the minister in the village of Crimond in Aberdeen-shire. Lady Meg Colville (who died in 2004, aged 85) came to the rescue when the Princess Elizabeth announced, shortly before her wedding in 1947, that she wanted the CRIMOND setting of this hymn for the service. Since no written score was available in London, Lady Meg, who had sung it in Scotland with the two princesses in Crathie church, repeated it in her fine soprano voice *on the telephone* for the Organist and Precentor of Westminster Abbey, who took down the notes and then taught the Abbey choir.

Another popular tune for this hymn is BROTHER JAMES' AIR, which was composed by James Bain in 1915 and harmonised by Gordon Jacob, who taught composition for many years at the Royal College of Music, and who died in Saffron Walden in 1984.



It was Jesus who taught us to call God our 'Heavenly Father'. When the disciples asked Jesus how to pray he said: "When you pray, go to your room, close the door and pray to your Father who is unseen. And your Father who sees what you do in private, will reward you."

CALLING YOU TO SPEAK?

In my thirtieth year, in the fourth month on the fifth day, while I was among the exiles by the Kebar River, the heavens were opened and I saw visions of God. Ezekiel 1.1

Ezekiel was just thirty years old, and had been training to be a priest, but because he had been taken into exile, along with thousands of others, he could no longer become a priest, something for which had worked hard. It was then that Ezekiel saw a vision, like a dream, of a wind-storm and fire. Afterwards he wrote of what he heard God say to him:

"Son of man, I am sending you to the Israelites, to a rebellious nation that has rebelled against me; they and their ancestors have been in revolt against me to this very day. The people to whom I am sending you are obstinate and stubborn."

So Ezekiel did not become a priest, but nevertheless God sent him to speak to people of His love for them.

Six hundred years later there was another vision of wind and fire, which we may read in Acts of the Apostles 2: *When the day of Pentecost came, they were all together in one place. Suddenly a sound like the blowing of a violent wind came from heaven and filled the whole house where they were sitting. They saw what seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and came to rest on them.*

This time it was seen by Jesus' disciples, among them Peter was chosen by God to talk to his people:

Then Peter stood up... raised his voice and addressed the crowd: "Fellow Jews and all of you who live in Jerusalem, let me explain this to you; listen carefully to what I say."

What bridges this gap of 600 years between Ezekiel and St Peter, and the 2,000 year from St Peter to us? It is that God chose people then, and He still does today, to take His message forward. If you are a believer, that is now, today, in Dedham! However like Ezekiel, not everyone is called to be a



priest, although every believer is called to tell others of God's word, since someone took the time to tell you. Of course, it's easy to say, "let someone else do that". Imagine what would have happened if Ezekiel

or Peter had thought that!

In my short time in here I have become very aware that many of those who have lived in Dedham in the past have been called to speak God's word of forgiveness through Jesus Christ to the people of Dedham and to others. With these clear lessons from long ago you know what to do tomorrow. In fact, why wait? Start today. Tell someone that God loves them too.

MADE IN DAGENHAM

In 1968, the Ford car factory in Dagenham was one of the largest private employers in Britain. In addition to the thousands of men, there are also 187 underpaid women machinists, who primarily assembled car-seat upholstery in poor working conditions. Dissatisfied, the women are represented by shop steward, Rita O'Grady (Sally Hawkins), who works with union rep Albert Passingham (Bob Hoskins) for a better deal.

However, Rita learns that there is a larger issue in this dispute, considering that women are paid a fraction of the men's wages for the same work. Refusing to tolerate this inequality any longer, O'Grady leads a strike by her fellow machinists, for 'equal pay for equal work'.

What follows would test the patience of all involved in a grinding labour and political struggle that would eventually advance the cause of women's rights around the world.

NEWSROUND

Tony Howard & Alan Grego write
EVEREST: A DECADE LATER (3)
Ten years ago this month, Alan Grego published in this Magazine part of the diary of his trek in Nepal. In March this year he and some friends went back.

Immediately after leaving Dughla we began the long arduous climb over the Moraine of the Khumbu Glacier. At the top are many memorials to climbers who have died in the mountains; among them Scott Fischer, who died in the 1996 disaster, and Babu Chiri Sherpa, who set records for speed and endurance on Everest. From there it was a hard walk to Loboche, where we met a Korean lady called Yoon.

On Saturday we set off for Gorak Shep. It was hard work at an altitude of 5000m, with several moraines to cross. There were good views of Pumo Ri, Lingtren, Khumbutse, Changtse (in Tibet), Nuptse, and Ama Dablam back in the distance. As we approached Gorak Shep we were able to see the top of Everest.

We arrived at Yeti Lodge. Yoon was very poorly in the lodge. A doctor with a Canadian party saw her and said she should descend. However it was dusk, the trail is treacherous, even in good light, and it was freezing cold. The doctor asked David to look after her, make sure she took the pills he had prescribed and ensure the oxygen mask he had fitted was clear and in place. David and Dan spent all night caring for her, assisting her. The doctor told Tony that they had saved her life.

Next day, Yoon descended to Pheriche with her porter. Alan and Tony set off for Kala Pattar. Alan made it two thirds of the way, had his photo taken in a sponsor's shirt, and then descended. Tony went on to the top with Ram, joined by David and Dan on the way. Cold strong winds on the top and we hurried down. An evening of cards and reading. On Monday we walked back to Dugla, then took the valley trail to Pheriche. David was told Yoon had left and should be in Namche Bazaar that evening.

YOUR CHURCHYARD

Dedham's lovely Churchyard is private land, to which the public may have access under certain conditions. Over time these may be forgotten or ignored, so every now and then the limitations of both access and use, for the good of all, have to be published. The Vicar, Churchwardens and Parochial Church Council draw your attention to following rules which apply to our Churchyard:

1. *Children unaccompanied by an adult are not allowed in the churchyard at any time.*
2. *Memorials deemed unsafe, or unsuitable for safe maintenance, will be removed.*
3. *No glass, plastic, or terra cotta, vases or ornaments are permitted.*
4. *No memorial, ornament, tree or shrub of any kind may be introduced to the Churchyard without written permission from the Vicar. Any that have been introduced without permission will be eventually removed, without further notice.*

Ten Years Ago **July 2001**


◆ **FLYING THE FLAG** Peter Davies and Tony Blaxill solved the problem of renewing the flag halyard at the top of the church tower; 'A method of reaching the top of a 40 foot flagpole on top of 130 foot tower had to be worked out... Each proposed solution proved to be fraught with logistic problems, too expensive or downright dangerous...These were all discounted in favour of a cunning plan! Thin bamboo canes were lashed together and cord straps attached to them to hold them close to the pole and connected in turn, as a chimney sweep would use rods. It all seemed simple but, in the event, proved somewhat haphazard. With a bit of frustration a final tug was applied to the canes and the hook went perfectly into the centre of the rope eye, the eye was hauled down, the halyard renewed and the job was done. We had a bit of help that day!'

A Century Ago **July 1911**


◆ **CORONATION DAY** "Our celebration began with a Service in the Parish Church. Thither marched a Procession which started with commendable punctuality from the Boys' Elementary School... a detachment of the Dedham territorials... followed by the Boy Scouts.... Then came the Members of the Friendly Societies in their Regalia... and the children of the Elementary Schools.... Every seat was occupied.... Then... a move was made for Upper Park. The Sports Committee had done their work well.... Mr Deason's fireworks across the road in his paddock. The pig weighed 69½lbs., and the nearest guess was that of Mr. Edwards. W. Page won the cock and hen, and the cake... was won by Mrs Whistlecraft."



POSTCARD HUMOUR

Two Dedham postcards from the David May Collection, which forms part of the Muniment Library archives, are these examples of what are probably mass-produced, colour-printed cards that have been overprinted, for local sales, to include the name of this village.

The artists responsible for these cards are unknown - any information would be appreciated. The cards, which are unused, probably date from about a century ago, somewhat before the era of the more 'saucy' postcards that are associated with Donald McGill.
