SONGS OF PRAISE

Great is thy faithfulness, O God my Father, There is no shadow of turning with thee; Thou changest not, thy compassions, they change not; As thou hast been thou for ever wilt be.

Hymns Old & New No. 186

It would be wrong to assume that every hymn has been written or has become well know as the result of some dramatic experience. Some authors have simply made it their habit to write poems of praise regularly, even as often as once a day. Out of the hundreds of verses written in this way, only a few will be worthy of publishing.

Thomas Chisholm (1866-1960) was a Methodist, born in Kentucky, who was first employed as a life insurance agent, before becoming a teacher. He said that there were no special circumstances surrounding the writing of this hymn; he simply wrote down his understanding of God's faithfulness and how it is revealed in the Bible. God's faithfulness derives from another attribute of His character — His immutability, or 'unchanging-ness'. With God there is 'no shadow of turning' (compare James 1: 17). Chisholm sent these verses with several other poems to his friend William Runyan, who was a Methodist minister who had become established as a composer of sacred music. It was Runyan who recommended that the hymn should be published.

In 1938 George Beverly Shea was working in an insurance office in New York when he was invited to go to Chicago to sing for the radio broadcast from the Moody Bible Institute. At 8.15 a.m. every morning fifteen minutes of hymns were broadcast. One of the regular listeners to this programme was Billy Graham, who invited Shea to help him in the church where he was working as a student pastor, in Western Springs, Illinois. This led to Graham and Shea later working together in the large-scale evangelistic crusades for which they both became so well known. In 1954 they introduced this hymn to Britain, at the Harringey Crusade in North London, from which time it has become a British favourite hymn. It has been often chosen for wedding services and has been included in most hymn books published since.



GOOD WINE

'I am the true vine, and my Father is the gardener.'

John 15: I

The image Jesus chose when he said these words was familiar to his hearers, but his use and application of them was startling and original. At our distance from that first telling, and with our familiarity with the words, it is possible to overlook what it was that would have made people sit up and take notice.

Ever since the time of the prophet Isaiah, the mention of a vine or a vineyard meant more to Jewish people than a source of fruit or wine. The vineyard was a metaphor to describe the relationship between God and his covenant people. It had become common use by New Testament times.

So, by extension, the crop of fruit it produced might be understood as 'all the good' produced by the people, or the people themselves. Indeed, the Vine had become the national symbol of the occupied people of Israel. Thus it was the emblem on the coins of the Maccabees, the rulers during brief time (occurring in between the Old and the New Testament accounts), when the people of Israel had not been under the authority of an enemy power.

So it was that one of the visual splendours of the Temple in Jerusalem was the great Golden Vine upon the front of the Holy Place.

Many a wealthy Jewish person had counted it an honour to give gold to mould a new bunch of grapes or even a single grape on that great Vine.

The other Gospels have Jesus telling a parable with similar imagery but there the whole picture is developed into one of far darker shade: in the parable of the Tenant of the Vineyard, the wickedness which began with a failure to honour the owner of the vineyard, eventually leads to the death of the owner's son.

It's a curious fact that the symbol of the Vine is never used in the Old Testament apart from the idea of degeneration – of rot. The point of Isaiah's picture is that the vineyard has run wild. Jeremiah made a similar complaint.

St. John alone records these words of Jesus, "I am the True Vine". These words were startling. It was as if Jesus said "You think that because you belong to the nation or people of Israel you are a branch of the true vine of God, but the nation, the people, have 'run wild'. It is I who am the true, the obedient, the fruitful vine". continued >



By abiding, that is by grace being grafted into, this vine, we who were once not God's people, now have become his people, part of his vineyard. inclined to think that our finest, or at lesus was teaching that it was not lewish blood but faith in him which was when we are strong, when we are the way to God's salvation. No other qualification earns the right, only friend- we need least help. But, for example, ship with lesus Christ can do that.

lesus said "My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit and so be my disciples" (John 15:8) ... fruit that will last" (John 15:16). The vine dresser in the parable expected grapes. But, according to St. Paul, the heavenly vine dresser takes delight in each of us producing a fruit with a nine-fold characteristic "For the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, selfcontrol" (Gal. 5:22-23).

Some people are naturally kinder or more generous than others. But they are unlikely to produce the sweet fruit that God has in mind. And anything we produce by our own effort quickly turns to self-righteousness, which has a therefore not wealth, position, or sour taste for others and even more so personal achievement. The greatest for the heavenly Gardener. Bishop Michael Marshall, former Bishop of Woolwich, once observed that:

"There are few things more ugly than that of a self-made man who worships his maker".



St. Paul pleaded with God in prayer to remove what he called "a thorn in the flesh". And he said that God answered his prayer, but not by removing the cause of his suffering. Instead, he heard God say "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." (2 Corinthians 12:9)

There are two distinctive qualities about being a good disciple of Christ: First, a fruitful life. By abiding in Christ we are made, in the metaphor, a 'fruitful branch'. Second, bringing glory to God; the sight of such a life turns other people's thoughts to the God who made someone like that. The greatest glory of the Christian life is glory is that by our life and conduct, we may bring glory to God.

- Organising and helping to run the August Bank Holiday events.


There has also been the campaign to retain a Doctors' Surgery in the village. Two of the four directors of the Dedham Vale Community Health Association have been DVA officers.

LORRIES AND THE VILLAGE

For some time the Parish Council has been trying to find a solution to the problem of heavy lorries using our narrow roads. The vehicles (which are often foreign-registered) enter the village as part of a cross-country "short Garnett needs evidence of the extent cut" when heading, for instance, from the A12 to Harwich. The route is often chosen by a satellite navigation system which makes no allowance for the size of the vehicle concerned. leading to the use of totally inappropriate roads. The problem is then exacerbated because the length of the lorry makes it virtually impossible for them to turn around.

Occurrences could be reduced by placing more prominent signs at the Stratford St Mary A12 junction, thereby inducing drivers to reach their destination by a less sensitive route. The junction, however, lies within Suffolk, and there are, in any case, stringent Department for Transport restrictions on the signs that may be used on trunk routes.

We are pursuing three courses of action. The subject will be aired at the newly-formed Local Highways Panel, County Councillor Tony Clover will raise the matter with the various County bodies with which he deals, while Borough Councillor Christopher Garnett will continue to lobby Colchester Borough Council.


The initiative, which follows controversy earlier this year over whether the Chinese authorities would allow Bibles to be made available at the Olympics, has the approval of the Beijing Olympic

CHURCH WEDDINGS

Thousands of couples dreaming of a wedding will find more churches to choose, from I October 2008 - the day when the new *Church of England Marriage Measure* comes into effect.

The Marriage Measure, which has recently completed its parliamentary process, has made it possible for the Bishops to issue guidance to clergy on how the new rules will work. Existing marriage law, dating from 1949, established a right for a couple to marry in the Church of England in the parish church where one or both of them live, whether they are baptised or not, and whether they were churchgoers are not. To marry in any other parish other than the one in which they live requires a special licence or six months of regular attendance followed by entry on the local Church Electoral Roll.

The new law, initiated by the Church of England and now approved by

Parliament, will add to this right of residency, making it just as easy for couples to marry in a church where they have a family or other special connection, even if they don't live there.



The General Synod decided that the existing laws were too restrictive in what has become a far more mobile society and took the initiative to change them last July. Synod wanted churches all over England to be free to celebrate more weddings and thereby support more marriages.

The changes will mean that an hitherto unmarried and engaged couple will be welcome to be married in Dedham Parish Church if one of these conditions applies:

- one of them was baptised or prepared for confirmation in the parish;
- one of them has ever lived in the parish for six months or more;
- one of them has at any time regularly attended public worship in the parish for six months or more;
- one of their parents has lived in the parish for six months or more in their child's lifetime;
 - one of their parents has regularly attended public worship there for six months or more in their child's lifetime:
 - their parents or grandparents were married in the parish.

Ten Years Ago August - September 1998

The Headmaster of Dedham C.E. Primary School, Mr. Michael Atkins, retired after nearly 25 years in office; a Community Minibus had been purchased by P.C. Michael Sharp; John Blakesley provided a demonstration of bee-keeping at the Countryside Centre [now the Duchy Barn Community Centre]; the award of nearly £430,000 from English Heritage towards the refurbishment of the Hewitt Hall was announced.

Fifty Years Ago August - September 1958

Miss Betty Mallett retired, after more than twenty years service, from helping with the Sunday School; the amount of *lost property* in church was becoming an issue, among the items were a child's scooter, a tweed coat, and a great variety of gloves and spectacles; the *Dedham Flower Show* was not as well supported as had been hoped. The Vicar (who was the President) appealed for greater support for this important event in the village calendar; in the *churchyard a scheme for levelling neglected graves* was begun, so as to make the task of maintenance easier; the Rev'd David Sheppard, former England cricketer (and later Bishop of Liverpool) came to Dedham as the guest speaker at a conference for Young People.

A Century Ago August - September 1908


The scheme for the opening up of the windows in the Chancel was discussed: 'The Vicar is glad to be able to announce that one of the windows ... on the south side... will be filled with stained glass, and the suggestion that another of the windows should be dedicated to the memory of the late Miss Eyre, and paid for out of her munificent legacy...seems to meet with very general approval...it is estimated that the cost of each window will not exceed £200. The National School was closed earlier than the end of term, on the advice of Dr. Lownds 'owing to the slight outbreak of whooping cough'; Sir Hamilton and Lady Lang were thanked for hosting the Mothers' Meeting at the Grove

A letter from a certain Henry Shute, which is dated 'October 3 1699', has been found in the Muniment Room. Addressed 'For ye Revd. Mr. Burkitt at his house in Dedham', it is an attempt to gain his financial support for the printing of religious tracts for distribution in the colonies. For identification purposes the handwriting has been compared with that of two other letters from Mr. Henry Shute which are in Lambeth Palace Library.

The original document will eventually be listed as part of the National Archives research database.
