

The opening lines of this modern hymn, written since the hymn book used in the parish church was published, are some of the most powerful words of Christian faith expressed in hymnody for many years. Songwriter Stuart Townend grew up as the youngest of four children in a Christian family in West Yorkshire, where his father was a vicar. The Townend family always enjoyed music, and Stuart began to play the piano at the age of seven. Written in 2002, "In Christ Alone" was a collaborative effort between Townend and fellow songwriter (and now good friend) Keith Getty.

Townend and Getty admit they are motivated by the idea of capturing biblical truth in songs and hymns that will not only cause people to express their worship in church, but will build them up in their Christian lives. "I've been amazed by the response to this song," says Townend. "We've had some incredible e-mails about how people have been helped by the song through incredibly difficult circumstances." One described how a soldier serving in Iraq would pray through each verse of the song every day, and how the promises of God's protection and grace helped to sustain him through the enormous pressures and dangers of life in a war zone. "It seems like this song is timely," Townend says. "We in the West have had our sense of safety and security brutally torn apart by recent world events, and it's caused many to re-evaluate the foundations of their life. The song has helped to stir faith in many believers that God really is our protector; that our lives are in His unshakable hands."

VIEW FROM THE VICARAGE

A GOOD LOOK IN THE MIRROR...



LEGACY FROM LONDON 2012?

The Olympic Legacy was much discussed at the time of the games and for a short while afterwards. The idea being that a percentage of the public will be so inspired by the success of the athletes that they will be propelled either into doing something similar themselves or encouraging their children to do so. Serious activity, however, may not appeal to the vast majority of us even if a niggling feeling exists that some sort of exercise, both enjoyable and worthwhile, is possible and desirable. If the thought of competitive sport or visiting the gym or jogging does not exactly grab you then the answer could be to join a walking group. The Dedham Footpath Group has been going for nearly forty years and the format now is not so different from the first organised rambles back in the seventies.

At the AGM, usually in January, members are encouraged, if they so wish, to lead their own walk on one day during the 12-month period that follows. A programme of walks, some local others requiring a car journey,

are then agreed and the final details are sent to all members by post. The particulars are also put on to the web pages, the Parish Magazine and the local newspaper.

During an average year the group will organise between twelve and fifteen outings mostly of four to five miles with a few somewhat longer. The walks are usually on Sundays, occasionally on Saturdays and in the early summer, Friday evening outings are sometimes offered. Generally there is a cut-off point for those who prefer something shorter. The emphasis is more towards meeting with fellow walkers and enjoying the countryside whilst undertaking a gentle stroll rather than a brisk no-nonsense challenge. Dedham is surrounded by beautiful countryside and there is never any shortage of varied walks to be discovered.

Membership subscription of just £6 annually pays for affiliation to the Ramblers Association, our need to be covered by insurance, the cost of printing and postage and the AGM. ARDLEIGH SURGERY

The practice is migrating to a new clinical computer system on Thursday 8 November. It has been developed by our existing supplier but is a webbased system. This does mean that the clinical and reception staff will have to be trained in the new system during October with training sessions on various days which will put pressure on staff cover. There will be some disruption prior to the 'Go Live' day with limitations being placed on the pre-booking of appointments.

For the clinical staff they may take longer finding information and recording their consultations. 
