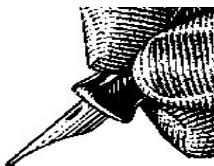

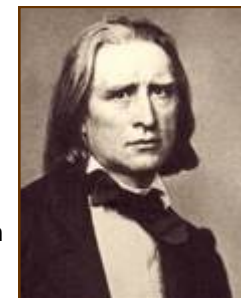

## LISZT'S LEGEND OF 'THE LITTLE FLOWERS'



Franz Liszt

'I am come that they may have life and have it more abundantly' – we see that promise of our Lord fulfilled in the lives of the saints, and especially in the life of this month's saint: St Francis of Assisi. One of the most popular saints in the western church, his feast day is 4 October.

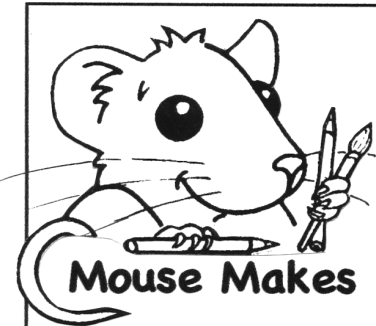
There are many stories which tell of his love for and goodness to the whole of creation. He poured out that love of creation in his hymn, *The Canticle of the Sun*, which we know as the hymn *All creatures of our God and King, Lift up your voice and with us sing*. It is the song of someone in a deep communion with even the most humble of elements in the great cosmos.

St Francis inspired a work of the composer Liszt. *The Little Flowers* tell how the saint was walking in the countryside when he saw some trees on which a flock of birds had alighted. He said to his companions, 'You wait here, and I will go and preach to my sisters, the birds.' As he approached, they flew down to him and remained still and quiet until he finished. 'And not even then did they depart until he had given them his blessing.'

In Liszt's Legend we hear the birdsong with wonderful trills and tremolos and then a broad melody representing the sermon of the saint. The work is technically demanding, but at heart is a simple, gentle piece illustrating the story for the listener. St Francis tells the birds that they have much to thank God for and that they should sing God's praises every day. It is that praise that rings out in the Legend.

Our Lord said that not a sparrow falls to the ground without God noticing it, and that care extends to all his people. It is a melody and an assurance that sing out in Liszt's work as they sang out in the life of 'il Poverello', the poor man of Assisi. And as they can sing out in our own lives.

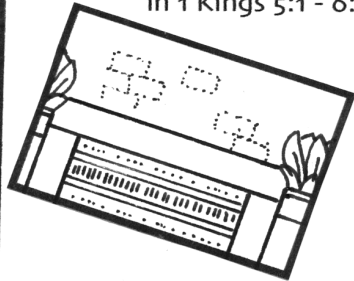
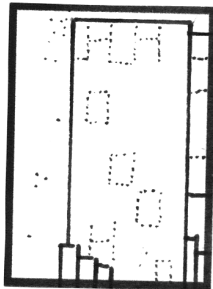

**JOURNEY'S END**

A Canadian-British woman with a Venezuelan birth certificate written in narrative Spanish; a non-native English speaker (having spoken only Dutch until the age of five); being a Reformed Christian who later embraced non-denominational Pentecostalism, and who then for love's sake accepted the challenges and blessings of the Church of England; a nurse who had worked in northern Canada with 'First Nations' alcoholics, in Ethiopia with leprosy patients and Cambodian refugees in Thailand, and malaria sufferers in Nepal, before facing the general ill-health of north Essex; Margarita's journey through life was surely anything but typical or ordinary.



Margarita's last year with us was also a journey, being a 'pilgrimage of grace' for her and all who knew her, through places of blessings and kindnesses that are personally undeserved. Being at the receiving end of compassion, medical and pastoral care, and of help from unexpected sources, was different from but in some ways just as remarkable as Margarita's other journeys and experiences.

These pages do not generally have space for well-deserved tributes to the others from our community who come to their 'journey's end', so it may be thought by some that I am exploiting editorial privilege as I reflect on the death of my dear wife in this way. Yet after experiencing such a wonderful out-pouring of practical care and support from so many - before, during and since the Service of Thanksgiving in July for Margarita's life - it would be strange if I did not publicly express my gratitude and that of family; this is my first opportunity to do so.

For my daughters and I, as for others in our community who have been recently bereaved, our journey continues. Family, friends and fellowship and even the kindness of strangers, will all play their part in helping us. Above all, for the three of us, it is the hope we have in Christ, and in His redeeming love, that will give us the courage for the very demanding next part of our journey. It will also be our only basis for eternal hope on that day when, like Margarita, we shall come to our own journey's end.

### CONSTABLE COUNTRY SURGERY

#### Annual Flu Clinics

All patients eligible for a free 'flu vaccination should receive a letter inviting them to attend on one of our clinics. Patients who have not received a letter and believe they should be eligible for a free NHS-provided vaccine should contact the surgery. Those eligible include over-65 year olds, patients categorised as 'at risk', and children aged under three.

#### Shingles Vaccinations

The DoH has asked all practices to vaccinate patients aged between 70 and 79 against shingles. We aim to do this as part of our 'flu vaccination program where possible.

#### Long-Term Illness Checks

We will be sending one letter a patient, rather than one for each condition. Once received, you should contact reception who will make an appointment for you and advise you if any blood tests need to be done or if you need to bring anything to your appointment.

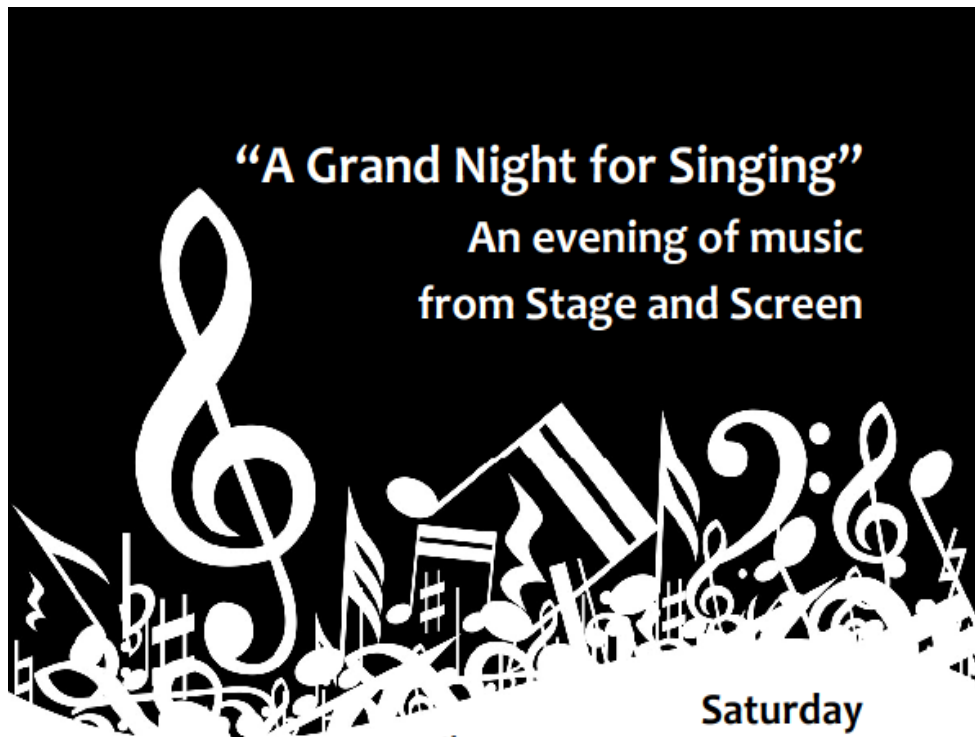

## PARISH COUNCIL

*Sheila Beeton writes:*

### **CHARGES TO CAR PARKING**

Over the summer months the Parish Council has been busy working on the car-parking strategy for the village; the latest position being that at a Special Meeting of the Council in July, Colchester Borough Council agreed to defer the introduction of car parking charges in Dedham until the Spring of 2014 whilst further research is undertaken on the detail of the proposals.

DPC has been progressing this with a survey about the usage of the Mill Lane car-park over the weekend commencing Saturday 31 August. This revealed that almost exclusively this car-park was used at weekends by visitors for sport/recreational purposes who at the same time supported our pubs, restaurants and cafes. A similar survey, undertaken on a weekday, identified the use made of the car-park by workers in our shops and offices. Full details of the survey will now be looked at by our working party who will shortly be concentrating on the issues relating to our business community.

### **RESURFACING WORK**

I am pleased to report the successful completion of the first part of the resurfacing project in Royal Square; the remaining component of this involving work around the Sports Pavilion will be taking place shortly.

### **FARMERS' MARKET**

It is with regret that I have to report that the Farmers' Market initiative has not been successful. Welcomed by residents and visitors alike we have failed to attract sufficient interest from traders despite many initial indications of support. Whilst we have not made a loss on this project, it cannot be considered to be viable without greater support. We will be considering further options of one-off specialist markets at appropriate times and venues.



### **OTHER BUSINESS**

Other items to report include the commencement of pathway works in Mill Lane which are desperately needed and the commencement in November of a new food recycling arrangement from CBC. 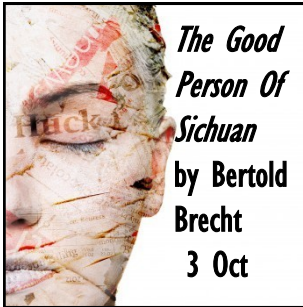

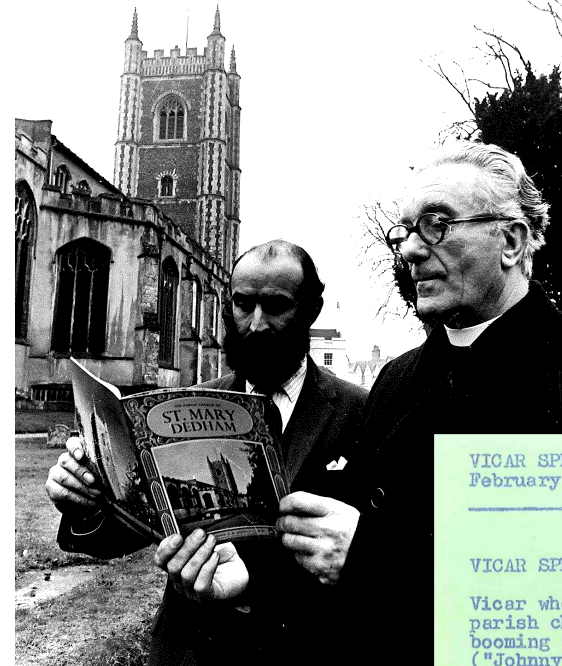
Fifty Years Ago **October 1963**

The grandfather of our Miss Agassiz, Capt. James Agassiz, R.N., was one of Nelson's Captains.

VICAR SPREADS THE WORD

Vicar who sees no reason why his 15th century parish church should not share in Britain's booming tourist trade is Canon ALBERT RICHARD ("Johnny") JOHNSTON, of St. Mary the Virgin, Dedham, Essex.

Canon Johnston, who knows something about mass communication (he is a former Fleet Street journalist), is seen (right) discussing a guide book with Mr. TONY ELPHICK, a public relations officer from Frinton-on-Sea, Essex, outside the church.

The well-illustrated guide, written by Canon Johnston himself, has sold 19,000 copies in 2½ years.

Thousands of people from all parts of the world are attracted to St. Mary's.

Over 12,000 signed the visitors' book last year, and these represented only about one in five of the actual visitors.

Twenty-eight thousand picture postcards of the church were sold.

The Vicar and his wife, who are both fond of music, were instrumental in the church's Choral Society having a success in America with a record.

It costs between £60 and £70 a week to run the church, and in 15 years £25,000 has been raised for repairs and maintenance.
