Hymns Old & New No. 518

This hymn was first published in a Supplement to *Hymns Ancient* & *Modem* in 1889. It was entitled 'Church Defence' and had six verses. In modern hymnbooks usually one or more verses is cut, and the first part of a verse may be connected to the later part of another. Dr. Edward Plumptre (1821-1891) was Dean of Wells, and one of the foremost biblical scholars of his day, yet critics have objected to the refrain 'one Church, one Faith, one Lord' on the grounds that it misinterprets *Ephesians 4: 4-5:* 'There is one body and one Spirit...one Lord, one faith, one baptism' by making 'Church' replace 'body' and 'baptism'.


The tune which is nearly always used is THORNBURY, which was composed by Basil Harwood (1859-1949) for a choir festival being held at St. Paul's Cathedral, in November 1898. This tune has also been used as setting of the hymn 'O Jesus I have promised'. Thornbury is a small town in Gloucestershire, near to Olveston, where Harwood was born.

One verse has lines that remind us of the courage and sacrifice of a few on behalf of us all, which makes the hymn popular at times of Remembrance:

> Through many a day of darkness through many a scene of strife, the faithful few fought bravely to guard the nation's life.

That this refers to a spiritual rather than any physical battle is made clear in the concluding part of the verse:

Their gospel of redemption, sin pardoned, hope restored, was all in this enfolded: one Church, one Faith, one Lord.





VIEW FROM THE VICARAGE

The Vicar has been unwell. This letter has therefore been adapted from one which he wrote some years ago.

STEP UP AND SHAKE IT OFF

A parable is told of a farmer who owned an old horse. One day the horse fell into the farmer's well. The farmer heard the horse whinnying frantically. After thinking for a while, the farmer sympathised with the horse, but decided that neither the horse nor the well was worth the trouble of saving.

So he called his neighbours together and told them what had happened. Then he enlisted them to help haul some earth to bury the old horse in the well and put him out of his misery. Initially, the old horse was in a fearful state.

But as the farmer and his neighbours continued shovelling and the dirt hit the back of the horse a thought struck it. Every time a shovel load of dirt landed on his back - the horse could shake it off and step up!

This it did, blow after blow. "Shake it

off and step up... shake it off and step up... shake it off and step up!" it repeated.

No matter how painful the blows, or distressing the situation seemed the old horse fought its panic and just kept right on shaking it off and stepping up. It wasn't long before the old horse, battered and exhausted, stepped triumphantly over the wall of that well! What seemed like it would bury it, actually blessed it, because of the way in which it handled adversity.

If we face our serious problems and respond to them positively, refusing to give in to natural panic, bitterness, anger or self-pity, then the problems that come along to 'bury us' usually have within them the potential to benefit and bless us.

At this time of year the following 'steps up' may also help;

REMEMBRANCE - GRATITUDE - FORGIVENESS - PRAYER - HOPE.

These are excellent ways to 'shake it off and step up' out of the deep wells in which we find ourselves.

As the Psalmist put it;

'Those going through the Vale of Tears may yet find it to be a well...' (Psalm 84)

Researchers are moving ever closer to clinical trials and there is real hope of treatment. There are some 40,000 people in the UK who are paralysed, 800 people a year are suffer a spinal cord injury and of those only 1 in 6 will walk.

As a family we were blessed to have 'walked away' from the world of paralysis but do not feel able to turn our back on those we left behind which is why we have committed long-term to raising funds for them. I have been asked to be the main contact for Essex volunteers - they call me their 'Essex girl'! HOME SAFETY SERVICE

Essex County Council, working in partnership with our Borough Council, are offering a 12 month free trial of a telephone-linked home safety service (HSS) to all Essex residents aged 85 and over. This offer ends on 31 March 2010.



The HSS involves the provision of a range of telecare sensors linked to a 24-hour monitoring

centre. All that is required is a telephone point and an electric power point (within six feet of each other). HSS sensors can include a personal alarm, bogus caller button, smoke detector, fall detector and others. Should a sensor be activated an alert is sent to a monitoring centre where trained advisors will take the appropriate action, whether it be contacting a family member, a neighbour, doctor, emergency services, mobile warden, or a local response service where this is available. ALLOTMENTS

The Dedham Allotment Association. in conjunction with the National Trust (NT), has identified a potential site for allotments within the village. designed to blend into the surround This lies in a field to the east of Bridges Farm, accessed via Footpath easily accessible fitness facilities 15, a track off the High Street, opposite the Assembly Rooms. Mr Atkinson of the NT explained what was proposed and highlighted the provisions that were being made to ensure that the site does not adversely affect the landscape, or the quality of life of nearby residents. In particular, sheds and poly-tunnels will not be permitted (the NT are providing facilities for tool storage within one of their buildings) and allotment users will be bound by a strict set of rules, designed to ensure that the tranquil nature of the village is upheld. The Council supports the proposals, of Essex Police, regarding the which will enhance village amenities and meet a genuine demand.

FITNESS TRAIL

The Parish Council is proposing to install a modest Fitness Trail on the Playing Field. The Trail, which is of timber-log construction and is -ing landscape, is aimed at providing within the village for all age groups. It is expected that the cost of the Trail will be met through grants, rather than the precept. Fifty Years Ago November 1959

♦ REMEMBRANCE 'The service will be held in the parish church at 3 p.m...followed by a ceremony at the War Memorial' ♦ CHURCH FINANCE 'I do hope the PCC ...will decide to appoint a Committee to go into the whole matter...we do not believe it is wrong for the Vicar to appeal for funds...but we must concern ourselves with the right use of our wealth and then the needs of the Church will look after themselves.'

A Century Ago November 1909

♦ HARVEST FESTIVAL Our services were held on Sunday October 3rd, and were attended by large congregations in spite of the wet and windy weather. The decorations were confined to the nave , as the chancel was not considered to need any extra adornment. The sermon was preached by the Bishop of Colchester, who visited Dedham for the first time on this occasion.

The Vicar is very grateful to the ladies who kindly gave their services in the decoration of the Church, and also to the many parishioners who so generously supplied the flowers, fruit and vegetables, - the latter in larger quantities than usual. Everything was distributed by the District Visitors on the following Monday morning, the sick and the aged being specially remembered, and all who received the gifts were very grateful.

- **BARKER'S TRUST A meeting [was] held on October 7th, Messrs. Percy Clover, F.H.** Coller, and J.R. Trigg were unanimously appointed to fill the vacancies owing to the deaths of Mr. E. Clover, Mr. W. Tinning, and the Rev. C.A. Jones.
- ♦ MARLBOROUGH HEAD The Dedham Old Quoit Club held their Annual Dinner... with their President, Mr. W.W. Hewitt in the chair, supported by the Vicar, Messrs. Evans, Page, N. Saunders, jun., Douglas Smith and others... an excellent repast was prepared by Mr. Springall, the landlord. Mr. Hicks was much in request at the piano... and made the evening pass very pleasantly.
