Hymns Old & New No. 139


Fred Kaan

[From an obituary in THE TIMES - 15 October 2009]

Fred Kaan arguably had more English-language hymns published worldwide than any other modern author. His hymns were also translated into at least 15 other languages. He was born in Haarlem in 1929, and moved at the age of 5 to Zeist, near Utrecht, where his family lived during the German Nazi occupation. His parents supported the Dutch resistance and hid small arms in their home; for two and half years they sheltered a young Jewish woman, Philine Polak. When she went missing it was thought that she had been arrested and executed. Unbeknown to Kaan, however, she survived and in 2005 came over from the US for a reunion with him in Haarlem.

Towards the end of the war Kaan came to active Christian faith. When the occupation ended, he resumed his membership of the Scouts, and it was through exchanging letters with a young Scout and Congregationalist, Peter Hayward, that he came to Britain. This eventually led to him being ordained into the Congregational ministry in 1955. He had ministries in South Wales and in Plymouth, as secretary of the World Alliance of Reformed Churches in Geneva and as Moderator of the West Midlands Synod of the URC Church. It was in Plymouth, in the mid-1960s, that his hymnwriting became a significant element in his ministry. Faith, for him, always involved a commitment to peace and justice. This came out strongly in his hymn texts and sometimes caused controversy, as in 1972, when Enoch Powell criticised Kaan's hymn, *Magnificat Now*, a modern reworking of Mary's song.

One of Kaan's great concerns was the unity of the worldwide Church, although his sights were set much more broadly. He wrote of the Christian Church as a microcosm of society, which must be prepared to transcend its limited ecumenical ideals. His first wife, Elly, predeceased him. He is survived by his second wife, Anthea, and three children from his first marriage. Fred Kaan, hymnwriter, was born on July 27, 1929. He died on 4 October, 2009, aged 80.

THE RUSTLE OF LEAVES

Once again this month there will be several public opportunities to pause, think, and listen to the quietest of sounds which are usually missed in the to each other. busy, noisy, lives we live. On 'All Saints Sunday' afternoon, many will be in the parish church to give thanks for those whom they love but see no longer.

On 11 November, many more will keep the Silence wherever they happen to be. On the following Sunday, a formal Act of Remembrance will take place at the war memorial, in this the 70th anniversary year of the hard-won by others, and in giving Battle of Britain. The Canadian term for this season of the year, 'The Fall', reminds me that at this time of the year we also remember the Fallen.

Yet this time does not have to be seen as one of only sadness. As the autumn's fruits prepare living things for winter, so the artist sees beauty in the changing colours and emerging shapes of trees and clearer landscape.

The poet and mystic Tagore, writing in 1916 and reflecting on a world in conflict, had perhaps this thought in mind when he wrote these lines in his poem Stray Birds:

Once we dreamt that we were strangers. We wake up to find that we were dear

Sorrow is hushed into beace in my heart like the evening among the silent trees. These little thoughts are the rustle of leaves; they have their whisper of joy in my mind.

May this month, with all its poignant memories and anniversaries, also bring you joy as, with others, we are grateful for the peace in which we dwell, so thanks for the love that we have known from those whom we cherish.

Chris Slocombe writes FEELING UNWELL?

Sometimes we may become very unwell and have to spend time in hospital (it can happen to clergy and even hospital chaplains!) If we are in hospital then it can be a time of anxiety as well coping with the discomfort of being ill. In addition to requiring medical help many also would appreciate spiritual and pastoral support. Some hospitals offer a chaplaincy service to fulfil this role.

As a lay chaplain who lives in Dedham, I am based at Colchester General Hospital. I visit patients from various church traditions and of no particular faith. At the chaplaincy we try to minister to all faiths and denominations, offering support and reassurance. Patients, sometimes also their relatives, may wish to talk. Others that the level of re-offending by those want to have someone pray with them and receive Holy Communion. We do our best to assist as appropriate.

Volunteers in Dedham have been carrying out random speed checks for nearly four years following an initiative by Essex Police to set up a county-wide scheme to reduce speed in rural areas. Our roads are relatively safe, but as Dedham is often used as a route from one place to another and excess speeding is still a problem.

Cyclists, pedestrians, dog walkers, school children and the elderly are all at risk, particularly in the areas of the village where there is poor lighting and/ or pavements. communityspeedwatch can save lives, and it has been shown reported for speeding in Dedham is at a low level. The number of volunteers we currently have is rather low and we are making an urgent plea for anyone who feels they would be able to help with this very worthwhile project.



DEDHAM FITNESS TRAIL

About eighteen months ago the Parish Council consulted residents regarding a fitness trail on the playing field, and a proposed layout for the trail was placed on the parish notice boards for comment. We received overwhelmingly positive feedback.

Soon, six new pieces of equipment made of natural logs, to blend into the surroundings, will be placed around the perimeter of the field to encourage exercise among residents. They are free to use and there is no monthly gym membership required! All the money was sourced through grants from the *Community Initiative Fund*, 'Awards for All', and Dedham's allocation of Section 106 money. There was no recourse to Council Tax or to our Capital Grant.

The trail is designed for fourteen-year-olds through to the eldest members of our community. We hope that it will encourage exercise by those in the village who rely on local facilities. Starting by the playground the trail consists of a Ladder Climb, a set of Balance Beams, three Chin-Up bars and a short run to some Hurdles. After a longer run along by the Black Brook you will be able to ascend the timber Climb Wall, before ending on the Parallel Bars by the tennis courts.

A formal opening is being planned. Meanwhile, we hope you will want to

make use of this equipment and also provide us with any comments you may have about it. The next Parish Council meeting will be at 7 p.m. on Wednesday 10 November in the Assembly Rooms. The meeting will commence with a

♦ DEDHAM LECTURE It was reported that over 500 people had packed into church to hear Bishop John Perry's lecture in October, on the subject of 'Healing'.


Fifty Years Ago November 1960

- ♦ DEDHAM ANGELS 'In the South Porch there is a carved angel by Miss Aileen Kent, who is working on another five to complete the set which will be placed in the roof of the Sanctuary and Chancel. It was with very real regret that this part of our decoration was not completed in time for the Thanksgiving Service [in] October. The carving of these angels takes longer than we expected. The one now on view took 9 hours per day for a whole month.... I think I should remind you that £1,000 was spent on the Tower prior to Canon Given-Wilson's retirement. Since then we have spent over £5,000...'
- ♦ REMEMBRANCE DAY 'The Remembrance Day Service will take place at the Congregational Chapel and will be conducted by the Rev. W.G. Crane... the Address will be given by the Vicar. A short ceremony at the War Memorial will follow after the service in Chapel.
- ♦ LETTER FROM AMERICA There was a report by Mrs. Grace Hine, a teacher from Dedham, Mass., about the visit of the American children to our village the previous summer, and the speech made by young Joel Brenner about his visit. The effect of Hurricane 'Donna', with its gusts of up to 125 miles an hour, was also mentioned.

A Century Ago November 1910

- ♦ MAGIC LANTERN 'The Meeting of the National Service League will take the form of a Lantern Lecture, which will be given by Captain Butler. His Lecture, which will be illustrated by lime-light views, will be on the subject of the Invasion of France by Germany in 1870. The Meeting is non-political and there will be no collection... It may be well to explain that the object of the NSL is to secure that all able-bodied men of eighteen and upwards shall receive some military training, and be experienced in the use of arms. The idea is to form a citizen army for the defence of the country....on the lines of the system... in Switzerland at the present time.
- ♦ FOOTBALL CLUB SUCCESS 'The newly established Football Club has started well...
 They won their first match against Mistley Athletic the following Saturday by 4 goals to 2, and if anything played better the second half than the first...'
