

> 8.30 a.m. every Sunday, and that instead this will be held only on the first Sunday of each month (except August), or on other occasions by notice.



NATIONAL COOKING COMPETITION

For the past four years our Primary School has taken part in British Food fresh, seasonal, home grown, local fruit Fortnight. Last year we were one of the runners-up. This year our School was one of the winners! Twenty children were invited to attend Harvest Festival in Westminster Abbey, the first such celebration there since 1966. It brought together special guests from the world of food, agriculture, education, retail and catering, VIPs and the media. Four children from each school were presented their Harvest boxes, and met the Duchess of Cornwall. The children then took the box through the Great West Door and presented it to the WRVS volunteers who loaded the boxes onto a Fuller's Brewery dray (horse and cart) ready to distribute them to a community network.

> Our Harvest box held honey biscuits (made by Yr I), Harvest loaves (Yr 2) crisps (Yr 5) and a range of apple puddings (Yr 6). Years 3 and 4 went to Evans Butchers and were shown how sausages are made, and to the village allotments where they met Ginny Appleby who helped the children identify different fruit and vegetables. Back in class they made pasties using local produce. The box also held local apples, eggs, Evans sausages, apple juice (made by Yr 6) and cress grown in an old teapot by the Reception class, and potatoes grown in the school garden. The travel to the Abbey was kindly funded by William Burkitt's Charity.


Philip (Brosnan), an Englishman living in Denmark, is a lonely, middle-aged widower and estranged single father.

PAST TIMES

Ten Years Ago November 2003

- ♦ DEDHAM LECTURES 'The origin of the Dedham Lectures is discussed in a new book by Collinson, Craig and Usher (Church of England Record Society), which the Vicar has had a hand in publishing. Included in it are the once-secret Minutes kept by men who met to study the Bible during the troubled times of the 1580s. These meetings, called Classis, took place throughout East Anglia but only the ones held in Dedham and Braintree have such extensive records remaining.
- ♦ SHELLEY BARN 'An application to restore the barn for residential use, complete with thatched roof, had been received. The Parish Council is pleased to be able to endorse this news. The unsightly remains of the near collapsed barn on Grove Hill have been the subject of speculation over the years. It is good to know that there will be a restoration.'

Fifty Years Ago November 1963

- ♦ FROM THE PARISH REGISTERS
 'Holy Matrimony Oct. 6 Peter Michael Gotelee and Sarah Elizabeth Mason'
 [Congratulations Michael and Sally!]
- NORTH PORCH 'the wrought iron lamp shade in the north porch was given by Mr. Wood of the Heath...'
- ♦ CHURCHYARD TREES 'the one nearest the old chestnut tree is a Metasequoia growing possibly 50ft. or more. (It is sometimes confused with the American Swamp Cypress) ... there are two Bush Juniper... [and a] Grey Sitka Spuce, Silver Birch, Serbian Spruce; Wild Cherry and a European Larch.'

A Century Ago November 1913

- ♦ CHANGES IN THE VILLAGE 'There have been a good many changes among the residents of Dedham... The old Grammar School, which stood so long empty, has now been turned into a private residence... and Ivy Lodge [now Ivy House] will shortly be occupied... we hope to welcome the new occupants of the Grove...'
- ♦ DEDHAM'S OLDEST INHABITANT DIES 'Mr Josiah Page has passed away...he was 93 years old last June... he was a very active man for his great age, and scorned the help of a walking stick...'

PAST TIMES

DEDHAM - DURING WORLD WAR I



Sgt. W.J. Harrington of the 2nd/ Ist Hertfordshire Yeomanry - in June 1916

This photograph / postcard was purchased for the Muniment Library archives in September 2013.

Apart from being the earliest photograph of a mounted soldier in the village, it is also the earliest-known photograph of the Assembly Rooms (as it was then called - it was re-named 'Hewitt Memorial Hall' in 1918), which are just visible in the background.

There is also a tall wooden pole, though it is unclear whether it was for carrying electricity or telephone cables.
