

weeks over the seasonal periods will run from 15 December until 3 January, instead of alternating between BLUE and GREEN weeks as usual. This means that the GREEN week that would normally fall on Christmas week needed. We reimburse your private will be replaced with a BLUE week, as shown on your recycling calendar 2008/09.

Plastic and garden waste collections will recommence the week beginning 5 January 2009. Residents are encouraged to save their plastics in the clear recycling sacks provided and not to send them to the landfill in their black sacks.

VIEW FROM THE VICARAGE

'FEAR NOT ...'

As the days draw in, curtains close and blinds come down earlier in the darkening afternoons. Lamps are switched on and fires burn in the grate. Collars are turned up, hats, coats and scarves are donned at the bite of the weather. Our thoughts turn towards carols and tree decorations, mince-pies and the wrapping of gifts, Nativity plays and family togetherness - that is, always supposing that we have secure homes, warm clothes, enough food, an income to pay for presents, (and which will be there in the New Year) and families to love and to be loved by. Those who have all of these things are in the minority in the world and, possibly, even in this country.

Every year, as regular as Christmas itself, Christian ministers will go on about how the significance of the season is lost in the clang of cash-registers, the jangle of lingle Bells or the nightmare of non-stop l'm dreaming of a White Christmas. Just as reliably (even in times of recession), our towns and cities will be filled with people spilling out of bars in 'Father Christmas' hats, trying vainly to remember the words of Here comes Santa Claus or Merry Christmas, Everybody. Yet in spite of all of that, the Christmas festival continues to have a strong hold on both our imagination and our hopes.


For the Christian believer no amount of personal or cultural distraction can spoil that moment when, perhaps in a carol, or a prayer, or a Bible reading, a unique stillness falls. In that moment it is as if the world, with all its busyness, holds its breath and we are reminded that *Emmanuel*, 'God-with-us' has come into the world. The Servant King, born into the muck of a stable, amidst the pettiness and preoccupation of simple lives, was in that moment God's answer to the conceit of the powerful: that they are 'in charge'.

It was as a painfully shy man, who was obliged by accident of birth and the disaffection of his older brother to

become monarch, that King
George VI contemplated the first
Christmas of World War II, in
1939. He had good reasons to
be afraid that Christmas, having
seen as a young man the
consequences of World War I

(which was to have been 'over by Christmas'), and through being privileged to know more than most about our vulnerability as a nation.

His wisdom was shown in that, as he addressed the Commonwealth, he did not speak of our strength of arms, still less of power and authority. Instead he chose to read some words which had been written in 1908, and for a century have been a comfort to many who have cause to fear for the future:




VIEW FROM THE VICARAGE (CONTINUED)

"I said to the man who stood at the gate of the year, 'Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown.' And he replied, 'Go out into the darkness and put your hand into the hand of God. That shall be to you better than light and safer than a known way!' So I went forth and finding the Hand of God, trod gladly into the night.

It was into a fearful world and at an anxious time that Jesus Christ was born. God's gift of love was given both to 'comfort the disturbed and to disturb the comfortable'. If you take time to be present at a church service this Christmas, or if one catches you by eye or ear through TV or radio, listen again to St. Luke's telling of that first Christmas. You will find a source of hope that fear cannot destroy:



"Fear not, for I bring you good news of a great joy which will come to all people. For to you is born this day in the town of David a Saviour, who is Christ the Lord."

S. Luke 2: 10-11

May God bless you this Christmas.



SPEEDING VEHICLES

Many Dedham residents are worried by vehicles that exceed the speed limit and are driven without due regard for other road users. Ardleigh Road and Long Road East and West have been identified as particular areas of concern, with high levels of speeding.



We believe that most of the problems are due to a lapse of concentration rather than a deliberate intention to break the law. We therefore we plan to erect up to three

Vehicle Activated Speed signs which automatically remind speeding motorists of the legal limit, and ask them to slow down, and to site them in Ardleigh Road (south of the junction with Long Road West) and in Long Road East and West (on the approach to the Heath crossroads, a notorious accident black spot). Currently funding is available only for the first of these locations.

The signs will not improve the rural street scene, but we consider this is a price worth paying in order to gain a significant improvement in road safety. We think that this view is shared by the majority of residents, but we would like to hear your constructive views regarding the proposals. 

PAST TIMES

Ten Years Ago December 1998 & January 1999

- ♦ HALLELUJAH! Roy Flewin led a rehearsal of Handel's Hallelujah Chorus prior to it being sung by a 'scratch' choir as the climax of the Carols by Candlelight.
- ♦ 'GHOST TRAIN' The *Dedham Players*' last production in the Hewitt Hall, prior to it being closed for refurbishment as part of the Assembly Rooms, was a period comedy/thriller by Arnold Ridley (who played Private Godfrey in *Dad's Army*).
- The Hengrave Hall, near Bury St. Edmunds.

Fifty Years Ago December 1958 & January 1959

- ♦ CHOIR OF 80 CHILDREN from Westbourne Secondary Modern School, Ipswich, under the direction of Mrs. Lusty, sang at the Carol Service. The Dedham Choral Society sang at the evening service on the Sunday after Christmas.
- ♦ CHARLES CLOVER & LORRAINE BARFORD were baptized 23 November.
- PARSONS FIELD ALLOTMENT ASSOC. held its AGM at the Rose & Crown
- ♦ CANON WILLIAM HOUSE died. He had served as a curate of St Anne, Limehouse in 1896, before being rector successively of Barnstable, Gt. Dunmow and Copford and "had endeared (himself) to the people of Dedham"
- NEW COVER For the first time the *Parish Magazine* was published with a three -colour cover, being a picture looking through the Galilee Porch from the South.

A Century Ago December 1908 & January 1909

- ♦ ADVENT PRAYERS Evening Prayer was said daily at 5 o'clock during Advent.
- ♦ CHANCEL WINDOWS A memorandum for the proposed new windows in the Chancel was published. Three windows, the East one and the central one on either side, were already filled with stained glass, to designs by the late C.E. Kempe. The proposal was that the remaining four closed windows should be opened up, under the direction of Mr. T.G. Jackson R.A. When the work of restoring the walls of the Chancel was completed the windows would be fitted by Walter E. Tower, successor to Kempe. On the North side the theme would be the Old Covenant: Presentation in the Temple, with David, Abraham and Solomon above; also Sermon on the Mount with Samuel, Moses and Ezra above. On the South side, representing the New Covenant, The Baptism of our Lord, with Amos, Elijah and Malachi; also Holy Supper at Emmaus, near a figure of St Luke (who alone records this incident) with Jeremiah, Isaiah and Ezekiel above.
