#### **VIEWPOINT:**

#### **Viewpoint: Slowing down**



I often walk up Mill Lane and around the village and have found myself saying out loud 'Slow down, slow down' as a vehicle has roared past me at well over 30mph. Perhaps you've done the same? I fear there is an accident waiting to happen. The legal speed limit is 30 but personally I think in a village with country roads and lots of local people and tourists around along with runners, cyclists, horses and farm vehicles 20mph is quite fast enough. Could we all slow down?

In March last year we had the lockdown which forced us all to slow down and we are now in the midst of another one. The restrictions had their down side, for some felt lonely and isolated, and parents struggled with home schooling. But there were benefits from the forced slow down. For in slowing down many realised just how busy and hectic their lives were and its impact on family life; others realised that when you slow down there is time to talk. Strange to say even with social distancing we were actually more sociable! And because we had slowed down there were many expressions of kindness and love. We learnt too that slowing down proved good for the environment and there was a greater appreciation of the countryside around, we could even hear the birds sing.

Many made a promise to themselves that when the lockdown was over to keep some of the lifestyle changes they had made. I wonder if you were one of them? And have you?

In the cycle of the church year there is a season for slowing down and reflection and it is called Lent which begins on Ash Wednesday 17<sup>th</sup> February.

Lent is the time when we remember Jesus' forty days in the wilderness where he went without food and faced temptation and so is a time when Christians do a spiritual stock take and reflect on their life and faith. In Lent, reflecting how Jesus fasted some people as a discipline give something up, like chocolate, biscuits or alcohol and the money saved they give to a good cause. But Lent is more than just giving something up it is a call to slow down and think about your life and its purpose and about faith and where God fits in.

This awful pandemic has made many people re-evaluate what is important in life. If that's you why not take the opportunity this Lent to slow down and give some thought to the spiritual side of your life. Maybe watch in the comfort of your own home one of our Church services on Youtube which you can access from the church website. In the Bible there is a book of poetry called the Psalms and these express a whole range of human emotions which is why many people identify with them. In one (Psalm 46) the psalmist says this: 'Be still and know that I am God' Slowing down can be good for your body, mind and soul. I commend slowing down to you.

Finally to say if you are driving through Dedham or Ardleigh and get stuck behind a grey car doing 20mph and are thinking of flashing your lights and shouting "Get a wriggle on granddad". I'm sorry it could be me. I'm just slowing down!




**Test and Trace Payments**

#### **The Assembly Rooms**

Our eighteenth-century Assembly Room dates from the period when Dedham was a thriving market town with a popular school and busy social life at the centre of a district where there were a good many comfortably-off families living in large houses. Local historian Gerald O. Rickword, who assisted Canon Rendall and annotated a copy his book Dedham Described and Deciphered (1937) with meticulously attributed information. states that it was erected by John Fox in 1730. I have been unable to verify this but the building is likely to have been put up at about this time to cater for a growing demand for local entertainment, when a dynamic new headmaster Thomas Grimwood was enlarging the Grammar School and increasing the number of pupils. Some primary timber in the main hall has been tree-ring dated to 1744 and the Assembly Room was certainly in existence by 1748 when Horace Walpole, who was staying with his friend Richard Rigby at Mistley Hall, made a satirical reference in a letter to "a auarrel at Dedham assembly that is capable of involving all Europe in a new war"

Ours is one of the oldest Assembly Rooms in the country and the earliest known to have been built to the full design on its own site rather adapted to fit a restricted space in a town centre. Unusually for its period it was built with a timber frame and stuccoed walls instead of solid masonry. The interior with its a shallow arched ceiling, original chimneypiece and balcony with flat vase-

shape balusters have all survived. In John Constable's view of *The Vale of Dedham* painted in 1828 (now in the National Gallery of Scotland) one can see the pedimented front of the building without wings but there must have been service rooms of some sort further back out of sight; single-bayed extensions on either side were lengthened in the mid nineteenth century.

The Dedham Assembly had a wide catchment area, since the nearest rivals were at Bury St Edmunds and Bocking. lane Austen's contemporary description of a ball in a country Assembly Room in her novel Pride and Prejudice, published in 1813 helps us to visualise these occasions. A detailed account of our Dedham assemblies from 1818 onwards was written by Mr P. L'Estrange Ewen, who lived at the Rookery (now Dalethorpe) and lists the many "families of distinction" from country houses such as Giffords Hall, Hintlesham Hall and Wivenhoe Park who attended them. The balls were funded by local residents who subscribed for tickets costing about five shillings each for themselves and their guests.

The company included nobility and gentry, members of the Diplomatic Corps and Army and Navy officers. The balls, attended by between 140 and 180 people, always took place on Fridays and a night with a full moon would be chosen for the benefit of the coachmen. Until 1840 there were three balls every winter, one in early December, another around New Year and a third towards the end of January. Five or six musicians provided the accompaniment for the dancing which began at half past nine. There were card tables in an adjoining room where three or four rubbers of whist would be in progress during the evening. At midnight there was a break for supper and men-servants brought six long tables into the hall, as well as extra chairs so that all the ladies could sit down. Refreshments consisted of ham and tongue sandwiches, bread and butter and cakes. There was tea at one end of each table and coffee at the other. No wine or other alcohol was allowed. By mid nineteenth century the the Assembly Rooms had become less popular. Only 40 people attended an Easter ball in 1852, the only one held that year but some dances such as Hunt Balls or the annual County Ball

continued to be held until about 1870. In 1830 the building belonged to a Mr John Fox, who was a substantial property-owner in the parish and possibly a descendant of the original builder. It then passed to a Mr Freeman and subsequently to a Mr Welbore Ellis of London. After his death it was bought by a group of local residents who used part of it as a Gentlemen's Club. Ted Eley told me that their meetings were not always very gentlemanly! Sometimes the members were a bit "fresh" with the girls who served their meal, he said, or got rowdy on the way home; on one occasion the awning of Ray's shop was pulled down.

#### FEATURE: DEDHAM ASSEMBLY ROOMS

By the early twentieth century the Assembly Rooms had fallen into a dilapidated state with part of the building being used as a furniture store by the antique dealer Mr Griffiths, who had a shop in the High Street. In 1908 it was bought by Mr William Wilkins Hewitt (1840-1917) of Lower Park, a considerable benefactor to the village. As well as making structural repairs he increased the accommodation by extending the wings on either side and giving them projecting gabled fronts, so as to provide space for new toilets. The present Reading Room was added then and in the main hall an internal staircase leading up to the gallery. Bookshelves were installed in the recesses where there are now two doorways on the wall opposite the fireplace.

William Hewitt presented the renewed hall as a gift to the parish in memory of his brother lames (d.1905), whose portrait by Charles H. Parker now hangs in the gallery above the entrance beside the donor's own portrait by the same artist. Other gifts included three fullsized copies of paintings by John Constable, done by Sydney A. Driver of Ardleigh who had trained in London at St Martins School of Art and the Slade. Only two of these have survived, The Cornfield above the chimneypiece in the main hall and The Valley Farm which it is intended should be hung on the opposite wall. Canon Rendall records that further gifts to the community included "portrait prints and engravings of notable personages connected with past of Dedham" and "an illuminated reproduction of the Charter" of the Grammar School. Fairs.

All surviving material relating to Dedham is now preserved in the Muniment Room. A well-chosen selection of topical and educational books for the use of villagers", protected with grey cotton covers, was kept on the shelves with lockable doors in the Hall; these books were still available for parishioners at sessions of the Essex County Library held there every week in the 1970s but I do not remember anyone ever consulting them. They were eventually sold to raise money towards the 1999 restoration of the building.

In his Deed of Gift William Hewitt set out the purposes for which the hall was to be used: for holding divine services of the Church of England, as a meeting or lecture room for bible and confirmation classes and religious instruction and for the instruction, recreation and entertainment of the people of Dedham. In gratitude for the donor's munificence the parish decided that the building should henceforth be known as the Hewitt Memorial Hall, a decision now perpetuated in the name of the main room. The restored Hall was inaugurated on 26 September 1908 and throughout the twentieth century it was used, as it still is, by numerous village clubs and societies such as the Brownies, Girl Guides, Good Neighbours, Horticultural Society, Mothers' Union and the Youth Club. Colchester Borough Council used it for elections and the Parish Council for meetings, the Dedham Players staged their plays and for a time it was home to Smartys Playgroup. In recent years it has been hired for Antiques, Book and Craft



#### FEATURE: DEDHAM ASSEMBLY ROOMS

In the 1960s and '70s Littlegarth School used classrooms created for it on the western side of the building. The present Mallett Room is named after the school's co-founder Miss Betty Mallett (1903-97), who played an important part in the community life of Dedham for half a century.

In time the fund which William Hewitt had provided for maintenance proved woefully inadequate and nearly a century later the deteriorating hall, by now a listed building, was again in serious trouble. It did not comply with modern fire regulations, disabled access or hygiene standards and was on the point of being condemned for public use. A thorough structural overhaul was essential and in 1997, thanks to the determination and organising ability of the Vicar, the Rev.Gerard Moate and his Management Committee, fundraising was begun to secure nearly £600,000 needed for a Millennium Restoration.

A magnificent 75% grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund, due to the building's exceptional historic importance, was supplemented by contributions from Colchester Borough Council and Dedham Parish Church as well as donations from individuals and local businesses and the proceeds of fundraising events. The major restoration was carried out in the course of 1999

and the building reverted to its original name. After a formal Re-opening of the Assembly Rooms on 4th December, a Millennium Community Party was held on New Year's Eve.

The architects John Burton with Simon Marks of Purcell. Miller and Tritton had skillfully replanned the interior of the building to make flexible use of its facilities. The two side rooms now provide further meeting rooms of different sizes and each has access to the modern kitchen, cloakroom and toilets without the need to go through the main hall. There is a new, more convenient staircase to the gallery. The permanent platform previously in the hall has been replaced by a demountable stage for performances and a Green Room extension was built behind the south wall. The Hewitt pictures have been reinstated and the walls are hung with reproductions of paintings by Sir Alfred Munnings donated by the Munnings Museum at Castle House. The Assembly Rooms are once again a splendid asset for the people of Dedham and the surrounding area, providing an unique venue for meetings, weddings, gatherings, and events of many kinds.

## **Management Buyout**

Dedham Therapy Farm offers Occupational Therapy and Animal Assisted Therapy to support people in our community with learning disabilities and mental health problems. Through activities such as animal care, dog walking, and gardening, we help people overcome barriers to everyday life. In addition to this service, we work with Universities by offering Practice Placements to students studying Occupational Therapy.

David and Gill De'ath founded the company, which began with visits to local schools, care homes and hospitals with the Nurture Dogs. Soon after, David and Gill decided to open a therapy farm in Dedham Village, where they were able to incorporate farm work into their therapy sessions.

Since then, we've helped hundreds of people overcome their battle with ill mental health and learning difficulties. However, we still have so much more we'd like to achieve.

In September this year, David and Gill retired from the farm, but we're pleased to announce that two dedicated members of the team and directors, Amy Boyce and Megan Dack, have purchased the entire business. This is an exciting time for the farm. Amy and Megan, who are both experienced in developing and delivering Animal Assisted Therapy, hope to tackle a wider range of needs within the community. We've recently noticed, for example, an increase in referrals from young people with dog phobias, and, as a result, this is service we will be adding to our future offering.

Due to COVID 19, we're sadly unable to offer community visits at the moment, but we hope to restart these as soon as it's safe to do so. In the meantime, we'd like to thank everyone who has supported us throughout the pandemic with food and cash donations, volunteer work and fundraising events.

We have used the time during the first lockdown to upgrade some of our facilities, smarten the farmyard, clear, begin clearing away broken structures, planting trees and building new sheds, animal shelters and fencing. Our staff and volunteers have done a great job and are always looking for more people to get involved.

## Essex & Herts Air Ambulance helps transfer COVID-19 patients

Following the busiest year ever for its critical care teams, Essex & Herts Air Ambulance (EHAAT) is now helping with the transfer of some COVID-19 patients between hospitals.

When required, the team based at the charity's North Weald Airbase travel by helicopter or Rapid Response Vehicle (RRV) to the relevant hospital, and accompany the patient in a designated land ambulance to the receiving hospital. The EHAAT team is able to provide the advanced level of care that allows a safe transfer of this group of patients. At present this is happening once or twice a day. When not engaged with transfers this the team continues providing its response pre-hospital normal to emergencies.

A second team based at EHAAT's Earls Colne Airbase is continuing to respond to the charity's normal workload of medical emergencies, cardiac arrests, road traffic collisions and serious injury.

Stuart Elms, Clinical Director at EHAAT said: "As soon as we identified there was a need, we put plans in place in early January to help with these transfers with the same outstanding level of care and clinical governance that we apply to our usual caseload. The first request came in within a few days, and we were happy to help. This is not affecting our ability to respond to emergencies in the normal way, but we will continue to review this.

"The system is currently incredibly busy, and we are helping to move COVID-19 patients from hospitals in our region which are facing challenges due to the

unprecedented number of patients they are seeing, to those with capacity. The aim is to help level the load and redistribute this huge demand.

"We are doing everything we can to keep our patients, staff, volunteers and supporters safe at the moment and East of England Ambulance Service NHS Trust (EEAST) are helping us by vaccinating all our frontline patient-facing staff."

"Please help us and our NHS partners by following the guidelines, staying COVID secure and doing everything you can to ensure friends and family are doing the same."

Last year was the charity's busiest ever year, despite a brief fall in the number of incidents its teams were sent to during the first lockdown. Between January and December EHAAT's crews attended I,626 patients, up 6% on the 2019 figure of I,526. One reason for the increase was that 2020 was the first full year of 24/7 operations (see editor's notes), which began in October 2019. A total of 480 patients were attended at night, who would have previously been in need outside of our operational hours.

2020 was also the first full year in which the charity's helicopters and RRVs carried blood supplies on board, enabling potentially life-saving blood transfusions to be given on-scene before a patient reaches hospital. A total of 72 patients received blood transfusions at the scene or in the air last year.

## **Dedham Horticultural Society**

#### A happy new year in the garden

With spring on the horizon, now is the chance to put the final touches on preparing the garden for the coming year.

I have three rhubarb plants and early this month I force one of them. Just cover the plant with a tall bucket, dustbin or forcer so light is blocked out and leave it for eight weeks or so before harvesting the tender pale stalks. I rotate the chosen plant each year so that the others can recover for a couple



of years afterwards.

Another job is to prune late-summer flowering, Group 3 clematis. If you don't know much about clematis pruning or keep losing the labels as I do, the groups are based on when the plant flowers and



the age of the flowering wood.

In Group I are early-blooming clematis that flower on shoots produced the previous season and need no regular pruning. You might need to train and thin them every few years, but mainly just deadhead. Group 2 clematis have large flowers between May and June on shoots developed from the previous year's growth. Prune after the first flush of flowers in early summer, back to a large growth bud immediately below and you may get more flowers in late summer.

Finally, there are plants in pruning Group 3; in my garden a yellow *Clematis tangutica* 'Lambton Park', blue bellshaped *Clematis* 'Rooguchi' and redpurple 'Sweet Summer Love' on tripods or scrambling through roses in the borders. I've seen nodding pink "Alionushka' paired with mid-blue Hendersonii' in another garden: both can be treated the same. All flower from mid- to late summer on the last two feet or so of the current year's growth and, if left unpruned, you just get a mass of tangled flowers over your head with bare stems everywhere else. So, I prune back hard this month to the lowest pair of buds, usually about 30cm from the base, then tie them in ready for the rapid growth they'll put on soon.

If you've lost all your labels and can remember what flowered when last year (if you can't, it's a good excuse to take lots of photos on your garden this year), then there's a rhyme to help you remember which clematis to prune: *if it flowers before June, don't prune.* 

By now my clumps of Sedum 'Herbstfreude' (now called Hylotele phium but I can't pronounce that let alone remember it) which I left for the birds and eye-catching frostiness, need cutting back. You should see the new buds coming through from the base already and, as the weather warms up, they are unlikely to need protecting.

Larger clumps of snowdrops (*Galanthus*) can be lifted and divided once they have finished flowering and still 'in the green'. Make sure the leaves remain attached to the bulb when you replant and they'll have a better chance of establishing than planting bulbs alone.

I have I.8-metre-tall clumps of *Miscanthus sinensis* 'Ferner Osten' and 'Malepartus' giving winter structure and making a link through the garden. Late in

the month (and during March) is the best time to cut back to ground level these and other deciduous grasses before growth begins. Just rake gloved fingers or a handfork through evergreen grasses to remove dead material.



All this (and plenty of other jobs) will help get the garden back into some order before new growth begins in earnest.


