

Baking Recipes...

CHOCOLATE DRIZZLED FRUITY FLAPJACKS



Ingredients:

150 grms unsalted butter, cubed
75 grms light brown muscovado sugar
3 tbsp clear honey
250 grms rolled porridge oats
170 grms dried berries
100 grms milk chocolate, cut into chunks

Method:

- 1. Heat over to 180 C/gas mark 4. Grease $30 \times 20 \times 4$ cms tin
- 2. Heat butter, sugar and honey in pan, stirring until melted.
- 3. Remove from heat and stir in oats, fruit and half chocolate chunks. Put mixture into tin. Spread evenly and bake for 20-25 mins until golden brown.
- 4. Remove from oven and allow to cool.
- 5. Melt the remaining chocolate. Drizzle over flapjacks. Cut into 12 flapjacks.

RECIPE FOR PRESERVING CHILDREN

Ingredients:

I Grass grown field
I Half a dozen children (or more),
Several dogs (and puppies if available)
I Brook
Pebbles



Method:

Into the field pour children and dogs. Allow to mix well. Pour brook over pebbles until slightly frothy. When children are nicely brown, cool in a warm bath. When dry serve with mild and freshly baked gingerbread.

CHURCH CHANGES

Much that is mentioned can still be seen inside the church, so the illustrations concentrate on features which have either disappeared or not currently visible.

The exterior appearance of our church has changed very little since it was built at the very end of the fifteenth century but the interior has seen a succession of alterations and restorations almost from the beginning. The earliest must have been the removal of the figures on the rood screen which divided the nave from the chancel in every church at that time. We have no visual record but a contemporary reference suggests that Dedham's screen was surmounted by the Crucifixion with the Virgin Mary and St John on either side flanked by archangels. They cannot have been there for long because in 1547 Henry VIII's Anglican Church decreed that all such figures should be removed. The screen itself may have survived much longer.

Luckily we have remarkable evidence of the church's appearance in the following century. By fortunate chance a very early glass negative has survived which shows the nave looking westwards in c.1850, when it was still furnished with box pews, a high pulpit and a reading desk complete with its Bible, an arrangement belonging to the heyday of Puritan worship in the parish. Sermons preaching the "pure" word of God were all-important then and Dedham had its own Lectureship set up in 1577.

A charismatic preacher John Rogers (c.1570-1636) was appointed Lecturer in 1605 and his powerful delivery earned him the name "Roaring Rogers". More space was needed to accommodate the growing congregation attending services at this time, so galleries were built across the two western bays of the nave and aisles in 1629. Although they almost collapsed under the overload of the huge numbers who attended Rogers' funeral seven years later they remained in use until they were taken down in 1862. All trace of them has long vanished though Dedham antique dealer Harry Griffiths is said to have had some of their woodwork still stored in his barn in the early twentieth century. The level of the galleries is clear because we can still see how the north door was cut across so that it could be opened underneath and deduce where the school boys sat because there are graffiti dating from 1701 onwards (like those on Shermans and the Grammar School) scratched high up on the second pillar from the west on the north side of the nave arcade.

The church has always needed constant repair and maintenance but in the words of Dedham's twentieth-century historian Canon Gerald H. Rendall "in the Victorian years [it] experienced the blessings and the banes of the Restoration period." In 1862-3 the church underwent a major reordering and rearrangement. The earlier furnishings in the nave were swept away. The box pews were replaced by a complete set of up-to-date

pitch pine pews, which increased the seating by seventy places. A fashionable encaustic-tiled floor was laid, its reddishbrown and ochre patterning inspired by medieval tiles, like the comparable floor which still survives in our sister church. St Mary's, Ardleigh. During the excavations which were involved the buried fourteenth-century font from Dedham's earlier church on this site was dug up and reinstated. In the early nineteenth century attention had turned to the east end, where repair and reordering led to the installation of a redesigned east window. This was shortened c.1880 to accommodate a new reredos, which is still in place today.

A thoroughgoing restoration of the chancel followed in 1909, funded by William Wilkins Hewitt and his sister Sophia in memory of their brother lames. All the furnishings including the choir stalls and altar rail were renewed and the tiled floor replaced by the present black-and-white marble paving. Four windows which had been blocked (perhaps to save the cost of necessary repairs) were opened up and filled with stained glass by W. Tower, nephew and successor of C.E. Kempe who had previously made the east window and those at either side. Comfort began to be a consideration and because extra windows in the chancel would have made it colder, a gas heater was installed there in 1909. In 1882 two cast-iron solid fuel stoves had been brought in to warm the nave. By the late nineteenth

century there was gas lighting. The church was lit by electricity for the first time on Palm Sunday 1934.

The organ in the west gallery had been made by William Hill and Son in 1843 and funded by subscription. It was enlarged in 1871 and brought down to ground level; in 1887 it was moved to the east end of the south aisle where it remained until 1975, when it was returned to its present position in the west gallery. It conceals the door to the ringing chamber, which was installed in 1963 as part of a major restoration and embellishment of the church which took place in the early 1960s.

To that time belong the carved angels' heads in the chancel by Aileen Kent and the heraldic shields on the nave roof. The font was moved from its central position near the choir vestry into the south-west corner of the south aisle. The nave was transformed once again. Stone and parquet flooring replaced the Victorian encaustic tiles and in the early 1970s the present oak seating with carved roundels and inscriptions replaced the pitch pine pews.

Innovations in the twenty-first century have been practical. In the early 2000s the stairs to the west gallery were rebuilt, replacing the worn-out steps with new ones carved with the names of donors or the loved ones they wished to commemorate. This made it possible for the public to access a new viewing platform constructed on top of the tower which was opened in 2007.






The organ made by William Hill and Son in 1843 situated at the east end of the south aisle in the 1960s.




View looking eastwards showing the east window shortened to accommodate the reredos installed c. I 880.

The door to the ringing chamber, designed by the church's architect Raymond Erith in 1963, which has been hidden by the organ since it was moved back to the West Gallery in 1975.



The former Vicar's Vestry c.1970; this space is now occupied by new toilets installed in 2021 which are concealed behind its closed doors



I am pleased to introduce myself as the new County Councillor for Dedham following the recent local elections. I look forward to the challenges ahead and representing this wonderful village. I will be working with our new Borough Councillor, Darius Laws, Cllr Nigel Chapman, the Parish Council and the local community to deliver for all.

I have started work immediately with my colleagues on your priorities such as focusing on improving road safety, tackling increasing rural traffic, securing a good deal for our rural highway network and investment in rural public transport. I will be working with the Parish Council and Borough Councillors to create a cross-village Highway Plan to address all of these issues. I have also been working with the Parish Council and Borough Councillors to map out how we will manage the increasing levels of tourism in the village and surrounding area.

The parking restrictions on the B1029 to Stratford St Mary were meant to be completed by Suffolk County Council in May. However, these were delayed due to the wet weather, which would have washed the wet paint away. At the time of writing in early lune, these were are planned to be implemented in June or early July and I am in close contact with my Suffolk County Council colleague on this matter. I have also been working with Suffolk County Council for a solution on Fen Bridge, which is owned by Suffolk County Council. Also at the time of writing, I am hoping for a positive update to be announced in the coming weeks.

The New Dedham Parish Council Takes Shape

Following the recent local elections on the 6th May nine councillors were elected to serve on Dedham Parish Council and at the first public meeting on the 24th May the chair and deputy were chosen by fellow councillors.

The new council now consists of the following members: Sheila Beeton, Ann Fletcher, Terry Haines, Paul Harrison, Emily James, Steve Mole, Gill Neville - deputy Chairman, Jonathan Smith (Chairman, Sandra Williams, Jayne Cole (clerk)

Since our first meeting much thought has been put into the structure and activities of working groups which councillors will sit on outside the monthly public meetings, to effectively deal with the multitude of issues facing the village.

Clearly times have changed in many ways over recent years and there has been a need to refocus efforts on matters which are high on everyone's agenda, as well as dealing with the normal everyday activities of a parish council.

The working groups are now as follows:

Group I - Financee, Standards & Procedures

Jayne Cole (clerk), Paul Harrison (Group chair), Terry Haines, Steve Mole, Jonathan Smith

This groups role is to manage the finances and ensure appropriate standards and procedures.

Activities to include: Finance and banking, Income generation, Expenditure, Legal matters, Procurement, Contracts, Parish grants, Budgets and accounts, Valuations and payments, Terms and conditions, Standing orders and financial regulations, Sports Club Leases, Insurances, Health and safety, Data

protection, Emergency Plan

Group 2 - Infrastructure & Asset Maintenance

Sheila Beeton, Anne Fletcher, Emily James, Steve Mole (Group chair), Sandra Williams This groups role is to maintain and improve the hard and soft landscaping which is direct the responsibility of the parish council and to monitor and report on infrastructure maintenance issues managed by other bodies.

Activities to include: Management of general and term maintenance contracts relating to footpaths, playing fields ,verges, flower tubs, play area, bus shelters, leaf clearing, drift paving, tree planting, hedge cutting. Maintain Drift paving and lighting, Liaise with EA regarding flooding, Develop and maintain flooding action plan and monitor Black Brook, Liaise with Essex Highways and Water authority regarding pot holes and drains, Liaise with CBC neighbourhood team regarding toilets, litter and rubbish removal, Maintain play equipment, Village signage, Employ local trades as necessary

Group 3 - Planning & Traffic

Terry Haines, Paul Harrison, Steve Mole, Gill Neville (Group chair), Jonathan Smith

The main role of this group is to review planning applications within the village and to comment to the planning authority as necessary, supporting residents concerns in particular when it is appropriate to do so. With the perceived increase in traffic in recent years due to new residential developments in surrounding emphasis will also be placed on lobbying surrounding planning and highway authorities to take a more regional approach to traffic management to reduce the impact on Dedham.

Activities to include: Liaise with planning and highways authorities on local and regional issues, Review and comment on planning applications on a monthly basis, Maintain and uphold Village plan, Lobby for improved roads in terms of volume and speed of traffic, Liaise with speed watch and traffic police, Lobby regarding a regional approach to traffic management to stop Dedham being used as the most direct route from local villages to the A12

Group 4 - Community Liaison & Support Services

Sheila Beeton (Group chair), Emily James, Gill Neville, Jonathan Smith, Sandra Williams This group will interact with the local community to support the health and wellbeing of the residents.

Activities to include: Liaise with sports clubs, Support the vulnerable, Support local volunteers and charities, Liaise with church, Liaise with healthcare bodies, Patient participation groups, Liaise with Community agents Essex, Community events and activities, Local bus services

Group 5 - Business, Tourism and Media.Anne Fletcher, Terry Haines, Paul Harrison, Gill Neville, Jonathan Smith (Group chair), Sandra Williams

The main role of this group is to work with local authorities and organisations to manage the impact of tourism and rising visitor numbers on the village as best we can given our limited powers, whilst supporting local businesses to benefit from increased trade.

Activities to include: Liaise with Colchester BC North Essex Parking Partnership (NEPP) Neighbourhood Team regarding and management of the main carparks, Business liaison and support, Uphold Street Trading policy and liaise with CBC regarding licences and illegal trading, Liaise with local tourism media bodies. Liaise Neighbourhood watch and police, Liaise with other bodies including land owners, local and regional councils, environmental and river agencies and support groups, AONB etc, Telecommunications, Communication via media, parish magazine etc, Parish website

Group 6 - Special Projects

Sheila Beeton, Anne Fletcher, Emily James, Jonathan Smith (Group chair), Other members may be co-opted as necessary. This group will continue to manage the Drift Works Contract and reconsider the landscaping proposals for Royal Square instigated by the previous council.

Any future civil and building schemes will be managed by this group.

Activities to include: Design and construction of capital works, Current Drift project, Potential Royal Square improvements to commemorate Platinum Jubilee

7. Personnel Committee

Members to be agreed as necessary, To consider staff employment matters

This new structure will be posted on the parish council website and residents will be encouraged to contact the working group chairs directly on topics which relate to the activities listed so that the group can action the matter as necessary.

Clearly residents will still have an opportunity to have their say on matters of concern at monthly public meetings in the normal way .

With a lot of new councillors there is undoubtably endless enthusiasm but needless to say it will take a little while to settle in and become effective so please be patient, we recognise the issues facing the village and will endeavour to improve the situation where we have the power to do so!

Divide and conquer

As I write this in early June, we've just enjoyed a glorious fortnight of summer-like weather giving the weeds – well-watered by that wet May – the chance to make strides in borders and beds and on the plot. Fortunately the wet and warmth has also given a welcome boost to a new *Deutzia gracilis* which is flowering its merry head off, while an experiment with Dutch iris (*Iris x hollandica*) has rewarded me with masses of tall and bright, yellow and white flowers.

The borders are full enough now that most of the weeds are supressed (or more likely just hidden), but there's still a little work to do to properly conquer the garden this month. Once the flowers have faded, cut delphinium flower spikes back to where the flowers started and you can see side shoots that might make more flowers later in the season. You can treat foxgloves and verbascum the same.

Give wisteria its summer prune to keep it flowering well by cutting the whippy tendrils back to about 15cm and shortening any of the main stems that are outgrowing their space. Give it some tomato feed after pruning if it looks like it needs a boost.

It's been a few years since I last divided my bearded iris (*Iris germanica*) and they are getting a bit congested. Dividing helps reinvigorate them and doing it now gives the plants enough time to put on new growth before winter sets in. Lifting them also gives me a chance to give them a proper weeding and yank out all those bits of grass and perennial weeds that I've only really chopped the tops off before now.

Get a fork well beneath the rhizomes and lift them clear of the ground. Shake any excess soil off and start separating them so that each plant has a fan of leaves, and a healthy-looking rhizome with a number of roots growing from it. Don't be afraid to just snap rhizomes apart as long as they have some leaves, but discard any that are shrivelled. Shorten the leaves to about 15cm and trim the roots a little.

To plant, dig a shallow hole with enough room to spread the roots out. These need to be below the soil but the top of

the rhizome should sit above, where it can bake in the sunshine. You may find it easier to rest the rhizome on a small mound of soil in the hole. Aim to plant taller varieties 30cm apart and dwarf ones about 15cm apart to give them room to expand in the next few years. Watering in gently can help settle soil around each plant but it's not essential.

With the proper care every few years, irises will continue to give a stunning display.

Despite the challenging start to the season, the garden is quickly catching up and there have been some great successes in the first half of the year. I've been trying a new feeding regime for my roses this year to see what impact it has on their growth and flowering. I started off with a dose of Growmore (fish, blood and bone is a good organic option) early on and have since been giving tomato feed every two weeks. With 100-plus roses around the garden (no, I've no idea how there got to be so many either), this takes about 3 hours and is quite a commitment.

Although it's still a bit early to judge whether flowering is improved, I have noticed a lot more new stems. I'm especially pleased with the effect on an old climbing rose (Rosa 'Guinée') which has always grown on a single stem to produce an almost umbrella shape. My regular feeding is encouraging two additional stems at the base and shoots along the whole length of the single stem, so the plant will bush out in time. As we gradually move further out of Covid lockdown, Dedham Horticultural Society is planning to host more events and I hope to catch up on your own gardening successes then.
